MANCHURIA and in the news tonight Page 5 here's something for somebody to be thank The most important news for today is an announcement by Japan. The Mikado's government agrees to withdraw its soldiers from Manchuria. This statement was made today to the Council of the League of Nations by the Japanese delegate. The Associated Press adds that Japan also agrees to the creation of a committee of inquiry to look into the dispute between China and Japan. Well, all xx this is appropriate Thanksgiving Day. news. China and Japan and the League of Nations have been wrangling over that question of withdrawing the Japanese troops from the disputed parts of Manchuria, Japan has been holding out against the proposal, but now she has accepted, and that seems the longest step toward peace that has been taken thus far. And it is also a great real cause for Thanksgiving.

From the great Chinese city of Tientsin, where there have been various

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disturbances between the Chinese and Japanese, word comes that for the first time European soldiers have been involved in the trouble.

The International News Service cables that today there was an exchange of shots between Chinese rioters and the soldiers in the Japanese elipiomatic legation quarters. And the Chinese rioters then opened fire on the Italian legation. Italian troops on guard responded by blazing away with their machine guns. It is supposed that the rioters were members of a bandit army.

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In the French Chamber of Deputies
Premier Laval of France spoke some strong
words on the subject of reparations. The
Premier declared that France had agreed
to go easy with Germany only for the
duration of the present world economic
crisis.

France will agree to a reduction of reparations only in proportion to the amount by which her war debts are reduced. France will not agree that Germany's private debts should be paid before the debt of reparation. And France will insist absolutely upon the payment of that proportion of the reparations money which is called "unconditional."

These, says the United Press, are the rigorous statements made by the Premier of France today. And his statements were received with wild cheers from the assembled deputies.

Somewhat melodramatic revelations took place in Germany today.

The government of the State of
Hesse made public a set of documents
which were recently seized by the police.
The German gendarmes have been making
raids on the headquarters of Adolf Hitler's
Fascist party. The documents are
supposed to reveal a plan by which
Handsome Adolf and his Teutonic Black
Shirts have planned to take control of

The Berlin correspondent of the

International News Service had an interview with the Attorney General of the German Government. The Attorney

General declares that the German

Supreme Court is investigating charges of high treason against Handsome Adolf

and his Fascists. He states that the

charges of high treasen have not been

proven. R As for the documents that have

been seized, they reveal a program

which the Fascists intend to follow

if they obtain power in Germany. It

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is said to be quite a militant program too, full of drastic doings and fire and fury.

But the Attorney General admits that the documents merely show the Fastists plan in case they do take over the government, and not any conspiracy on their part to overthrow the existent regime.

All of this hinges around the question of whether or not the documents seized are genuine.

The Governor of the State of Hesse, which is socialistic, vows up and down that they are entirely valid, and not forgeries or fakes, or anything like that.

The part of the whole business that comes under the heading of old time blood and thunder melodrama is the fact that the documents were discovered by a former socialist leader. Recently this socialist leader made a right about face and joined the Fascists, or Nazis, as they are called.

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1 He seemed to be a convert from socialism to Fascism, and Hitler's men 3 took him to their bosom with: "a hearty welcome to our city."

It is suspected now that this 6 socialist leader's conversion to Fascism 7 was all a pretense, and that he seemed to join sides merely for the purpose of 9 acting as a spy, with the plan of 10 getting into the confidence of the Kaskisks Fascists, learning their plans, and then exposing them.

The Nazis have now expelled the former socialist leader from their ranks, and he was brought to Berlin today under heavy guard. There was fear 17 that the enraged Black Shirts might try to kill him.

They say that political exgitement in Germany has been brought to boiling point by the new revelations. The Fascists are denouncing the documents as clumsy forgeries. And Adolf himself is said to be on his way

to Berlin to make a loud protest.

Tonight, way down under, Australiax is without a Cabinet Government. It is also without a parliament. The Labor Ministry was beaten in a parliamentary vote, and today the Governor General of the Dominion dissolved the law-making assembly, and ordered an election to be held to pick a new one.

The Labor Government in Australia was beaten on a vote concerning the unemployment fund. Australia has a dole, Something like that in England. And we are reminded that the recent Labor Government in England went to pieces largely because of questions concerning the dole.

On the stock exchange at Camberra, the Australian capital, prices took a quick jump. This was caused by the news of the downfall of the Labor Government, and by the expectation that at the forthooming election ** the Labor Party will be defeated. The supposition is, at least among the traders in the stock exchange, that Australia, like England, will go

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Walthe battle is on again, between the President and the Navy League.

They say that the big idea the Navy League has in mind is to keep the controversy open until Congress meets, and then force a congressional investigation.

Thanksgiving Day was the time chosen for the latest blast. The Navy League came out with a pamphlet today making a new attack on President Hoover, and denouncing the investigation made by the Committee the President appointed. That Committee supported Mr. Hoover, and denounced the Navy League.

The International News Service quotes the organization advocating the a powerful American fleet and declaring that the President in his campaign pledges, promised to keep Uncle Sam's fighting force on the sea up to the full strength permitted by the treaties.

And so, according to the Navy League, the President's present

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policy of naval economy is a violation of his campaign promises.

And this new blast is only a beginner. The Navy League issues this pamphlet with the explanation that this is only a beginning of what it had to say, and promises to come out with a long and ample statement later on. End then perhaps we will hear from the tresident again.

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There was a bad collision between ships in the Bay of Fundy last night. And today, after a check-up, it is believed that nine fisherman from Gloucester, Massachusetts, have lost their lives.

Their ship, the fishing schooner with a double name the Edith and Eleanor, had a collision with the Nova Scotian steamer Gypsum Prince.

The International News Service reports that the collision occurred in a fog, and the fishing schooner sank swiftly in the icy waters of the turbulent Bay of Fundy.

Tonight rescuers are fighting their way to a thousand or more Indians of the Navajo and Zuni tribes who are marooned by a blizzard on the top of a high mesa in New Mexico. The Indians are scantily clothed and have little food with them. They are in serious danger.

The United Press explains that this is the time of the year when the Indians go hunting for pinion nuts. These are a delicious type of nut which are found in the cone of the pine tree. The Navajos and the Zunis started out and tramped and climbed to a high table-land 70 miles out of the town of Gallup. Pinion nuts are plentiful in those parts.

Then they were caught by the hand of winter, which has been lying heavy and frosty on the West. A violent blizzard caught the braves and squaws. Heavy snow-drifts piled up among the barren craggy hills. They were snow-bound on the top of a mesa.

And it was on the eve of Thanksgiving when several of the nut-pickers

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who had been able to fight their way through the snow storm, arrived at a town and told the tale of their fellow tribesmen, marooned by storm and snow.

Rescue parties were immediately sent out. They found several Indians frozen to death. Some of the nut-pickers had been able to fight their way home, but hundreds still remained on the high plateau. Fifty horsemen rode out of the town of Gallup today to battle their way through the snow, with supplies of food and clothing for the Indians.

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Now comes what seems to be a new idea in the way of education for girls.

At the Dalton Schools in New York girls of high-school age are to be given, not dolls to play with, but real live babies to take care of.

Four healthy infants of a month old are to be selected by medical authorities from among children whose mothers are employed during the day. The babies will be kept at the school during the daytime hours, when the mothers are at work.

And the girl pupils will get a practical course of training in the care of children and the profession of motherhood.

In other words, the pupils, as a part of their regular school work, will act the role of little mothers.

The idea was devised by Miss Helen Parkhurst, head of the Schools, who says the plan is to discover the kind of training a girl should have during the four years before she goes to college.

Miss Parkhurst adds that she has known of cases where mothers were actually afraid to pick up their first-born babies -- a woman scared by the sight of an infant.

"We hope," she declares "to familiarize the girls with the routine of baby care, so that motherhood will come quite naturally to them."
