From Hanoi - comes word that the three U S pilots supposedly "freed" last week - are now finally enroute home. But they'll be making stops first - we are tola - at Nanning in Communist China. Also Peking, Moscow and Copenhagen before arriving in New York hopefully, late Thursday.

WHITE HOUSE

Here at home - the White House was refusing to comment today - on the way the prisoners have been handled. Press Secretary Ron Ziegler saying: "These men have been through a terrible ordeal - our only interest is their safe arrival back home." Next question: "Would the government bring changes against any of the three for anything they may have said or me done while in captivity?" To which Ziegler replied: "No, absolutely, No!"

PRESIDENT

Washington again - the start of the joint annual meeting of the international monetary fund - and the World Bank; began with an opening session address - from President Nixon - in which he pledged that the US - "shall not turn inward and isolationist. "But, also, calling for a "thorough-going reform," of the present world monetary

The President adding that monetary reform must be treated as a package - along with new rules for trade and overseas investment. For only thus - said he - can we "clear the path for healthy competition for the future." SALT

On Capital Hell -Washington again - the House Ioday

completed final congressional approval of that new five year Salt agreement on offensive missiles. Then Sending it along to the White House - for President Nixon's signature.

This clearing the way for US and Russian talks - on a permanent Arms limitation treaty; talks that now could begin - perhaps as early as next month.

From Secretary of State William Rogers an address today at the United Nations in New York, where he called for tougher measures against airplane hijacking -- and an end to "the export of international terrorism." Rogers asserting that the UN must act - and act at once - to meet this challenge. Then, Within minutes , a meeting of the UN's Where legal committee, The US introduction a resolution urging world wide acceptance of existing anti-hi-jacking treaties; also, calling for me a conference early next year - to draft a global campaign against terrorism.

WASHINGTON

Turning to politics - President Nixon won an endorsement today - from the powerful international longshoremens union. This marking the first time that a Republican candidate for 1 President thus ever been so honored. Union President Thomas so gleason praising Mra. Nixon for maintaining our commitment to international obligations; while at the same time taking new initiatives to ease world tensions. Also, praising the President's efforts to halt spiraling inflation - that has punishing all

American workers at and consumers.

BILLINGS

On the Democratic side -- Good McGovern Guy was, campaigning today in the Northern Rockies. At Billings, Montana & lashing out at the called and the hogs of big business; those - said he who have opened a revolving door between corporate board rooms and government regulatory agencies.

VIETNAM

Along the Central Coast of South Vietnam - a

government counter offensive has resulted in the recapture of a key hilltop near Ba To; and then pushing on toward an outpost lost to the Communists just a week ago.

The South Vietnamese are attempting to clear vital Highway One - before the start of another rainy season. SAIGON FOLLOW VIETNAM

A Saigon - a tightening of security precautions; with security officials **now** checking all cars - trucks and motor bikes moving through the city; **here** looking especially for ammunition - that might be cached in spare tires, bicycle**f** pumps or secret compartments; doing so we are told -- "in expectation of a Communist attack on Saigon - before the US Presidential election". Japan's Prime Minister Tanaka - today arrived in Peking, where he met with Premier Chou En Lai for talks described as surprisingly frank and useful.

Then - a state banquet in the Great Hall of the People; where in a toast Chou En Lai said "the Chinese cannot forget the unfortunate history - of the last one h undred years." But he then added that Red China and Japan - "should look for a betterment in relations;" a betterment - based "on the principles of equality and reciprocity."

Prime Minister Tanaka then admitted -as he put it: "the unfortunate history of **m** pastand recent Japanese actions", adding that he, too, fervently seeks - a "normalization of relations" with Red China; but keeping in mind said he "Japan's friendly relations with other countries." This perhaps a reference to Nationalist China.

This was the Tokyo Prime Minister's first visit to Mainland China since World War II when he was a private in the Japanese army - serving in occupied Manchuria. VALENCIA

With party loyalty the dominant factor.

Ah, but times change - even in Red China. We hear Chinese officials have finally been forced to admit a general erosion of scholarship. So, they have reintroduced the use of classroom exams. For "pass or fail", Bill, - a big RED "F". MIAMI

From Miami - the story of a rather remarkable young preacher - the Reverend Dean Blakeney -- who studied karate and swordsmanship along with his Baptist theology; now using all three -- "in the service of the Lord."
