In his address tonight President Truman

These declarations were made in the presidential

FOREIGN AID

The House of representatives tenight voted to cut the money to be spent under the European Recovery program, the Marshall Plan. First the Congressmen voted that the appropriation is to be stretched out over fifteen months instead of the one year. This was followed by a vote to cut the amount of the appropriation, Elekhing slashing it by more than half a billion dollars -- bringing the total down to a little less than six billions:

This is a rebuff the administration and Secretary of State Marshall, who argued with Congress against both proposals -- that of making the money last fifteen months instead of twelve and that of cutting it down by half a billion.

PRECEDE_PALESTINE

The United Nations tonight called an emergency meeting to consider an appeal made by Count Bernadotte of Sweden, the U N mediator in +o Palestine. The emergency session will be held tomorrow morning.

All this follows a strange episode with some of the aspects of a mystery. The message from Bernadotte was addressed in a cable to the President of the Security Council. He, as it happens, is Faris El Khouri of Syria, who is, of course, REER representative of one of the Arab states in conflict with Israel. The fact that he has become Presiding officer of the Security Council, as the Council considers the Palestine quarrel, has aroused Jewish protests. But the office of President of the Council is rotated from one member to the other and it was simply the turn of the delegate from Syria to occupy the post.

Late this afternoon the Council was all to

consider the message from Bernadotte -- but where
was it? Missing. Security Council president Faris
El Khouri could not find it. The cablegram was from
the U N mediator in Palestine had vanished. A search
was made; they hunted around for half an hour,
but still the Bernadotte message was lost.

That being the dilemma, the U N Secretary—

Enum General Trygve Lie of Norway, jumped in and put

a telephone call through to Palestine and got

Count Bernadotte on the wire. Asking "Will you please repeat what you say in that cable". So Bernadotte did

-- and the Security Council was able to go ahead on that basis.

what Bernd Bernadotte said was this: - his attempt to arrange a truce between Israel and the Arabs is deadlocked on one point. As we have heard, each side has attached its own interpretation to the U N proposal for an armistice.

The stumbling block is the question of
Jewish immigration. According to the U N armistice -

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proposal, neither side would be allowed to reinforce its army in Palestine during the time of the truce.

The arabs hold this to mean that Jewish immigrants capable of service in war, men of military age, would not be allowed into Israel. But the interpretation of Israel is that immigrants could come in. It would only be forbidden to give them military training.

So Gowet Bernadotte wants the Security Council to clarify - what really did the Council mean. Since both Israel and the Arabs give their own interpretations to the matter of immigration - it is up to the Council to fixe give an official interpretation of its own proposal.

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The news from Palestine features a naval battle - with ships, warplanes, and shore guns of Israel in action against warships of Egypt. Earlier in the day, Cairo announced an Egyptian Maval Bombardment of towns along the coast of Israel, and then came word of action at Tel Aviv - a naval battle.

The Egyptian Fleet consisted of one corvette, one x transport steamer armed with a couple of guns, and two landing craft - not such a vast armada. The Jewish Maval Forces, equally small, are said to have drive off the Egyptians. The clash at sea was nothing to shake the world, but it was a novelty for dispatches to tell of naval battle in the Palestine war.

at Jenin, the capture of which town is reported at Tel Aviv. Jenin is one of three key points, the other two being Nablus and Tulkarm. Each of these is at the apex of a triangle, which Israel calls - the dangerous triangle. That is, an Arab wedge pointed at the Palestine Coast,

Torpedo Eight flew out, led by Lieutenant Commander

Waldron, and himm blasted a great Japanese carrier with

torpedo hits. But they themselves, were in an inferno of

anti-aircraft fire and fighter plane attack. Not one

plane; and only one man, came back to tell the tale.

Pilot George Gay launched his torpedo, and swung around for a get away. But a Jap zero was after him. His gunner was killed. Shells hit the plane, and it crashed in the ocean. The radio man could not get free, and sank with the plane. But the pilot got out, and found himself swimming in the Pacific Ocean in the middle of the battle.

Luck was with him. To the surface of the sea came a rubber boat, which had become detached from the sinking plane. And mix with it - a cushion. George Gay could have ridden in the boat, but he knew that enemy planes had a way of machine-gunning survivors. So he used the boat to keep afloat, and employed the cushion to conceal himself - keeping it over his head. Afloat

and hidden in that fashion, he had a close-up view of what was going on - a kind of fish-eye view from the surface of the water. Nearby were three big Jap Carriers damaged by American torpedoes. He saw American dive bombers flashing to the attack. Masses of flame burst from the flat-tops, and immense clouds of smoke werk swirled skyward. His fish-eye view culminated when Japanese warships came in, and with gunfire sank a derelict Japanese Carrier, which was blazing from stem to warm stern.

Night came on, and the next day George Gay
was spied by American planes and picked up - brought back
to give the Navy a first hand statement of the Japanese
losses that he had seen at close range.
