GOOD EVENING EVERYBODY:

High up in the Himalayas - an official meeting today; on the Tibet-Nepalese border. At a remote place called Manitui, near remote Koray Pass. The occasion - Nepal getting back the ten soldiers taken prisoner a couple of weeks ago by the Chinese Reds. Also the body of the Nepalese officer - who was killed when the Reds opened fire from ambush.

Today's meeting - very formal. The Nepalese, saying - as little as possible. The Chinese - merely handing over the men and their equipment.

Dispatches from the Congo tell of increasing chaos in that vast equatorial section of Central Africa.

Correspondent George Sibera of United Press International, tells of panicky whites - fleeing from the back country, crowding into Leopoldville, in an effort to escape from the mutinous Congo troops, who are on a drunken orgy of violence and pillage, committing murder, rape, and mayhem against - all the white people they encounter.

Even in Leopoldville they are not safe.

Thousands of Belgians and other Europeans - in headlong

flight across the Congo River to Brazzaville, which at

least adhers to the French community of nations. Many

of the refugees - still wearing nightgowns and pajamas,

fleeing from their homes in the night - leaving everything

behind.

Correspondent Sibera says he's heard - savage denunciations of Belgium. Refugees, cursing their

homeland - for giving the Congolese independence before they had become civilized enough to know how to
use it. Correspondent Sibera's verdict on the Congo
tonight - "you can almost taste, the fear." Meanwhile
the Congo government promises - to restore order. But
when - as the white exodus goes on.

Jim Farley went on to give a hint - of his own preference at this convention. F.D.R.'s old campaign manager,

What made him change his mind? Cardona says the mr breaking point came when Cuban President Dorticos remarked to him - "if Cuba is going Communist, so what?"

threatening to sign a separate treaty with his East German puppets. The threat, touched off by - a decision of the West German parliament to hold a session in West Berlin, instead of Born.

The boss of the Kremlin calling this - "a provocation."

Our State Department, retorting - that Khrushchev prefers shaking his fist to negotiating. The American statement, adding - that the West, as a matter of course, will defend its rights in West Berlin.

KHRUSHCHEV

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Now let's take a look at - the thermometer. Of course what you see - depends on where you are. Today, Americans were feeling - the two extremes. Hottest spot - Blythe, California - where the thermometer hit a hundred and ten - in the shade. Coldest spot? From Little America, word that it's ninety-one below down there near the South Pole. A difference of Two-hundred degrees.

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Here's a question - that seems to worry some

folks a lot: - Are the Russians going to start an atomic

war, tomorrow? Down in Benson, Arizona, they are saying

- the answer is - "Yes". Members of an Arizona religious

sect expect to see Khrushchev's rockets heading right

for them - within the next twenty-four hours.

Members of a group that receives - prophetic

revelations - from somewhere in outer space. Their wise

men insist that Khrushchev is all set to push those

missile buttons - so they are all going underground. A

hundred of them - hiding out. Nor will they answer anyone
who calls on them. Their leaders warn them it might be

a Russian, ready to brain-wash them.

They expect to find nothing but ashes - when they emerge tomorrow. But - if they don't what will they find: For one thing a big unpaid grocery bill.

Local merchants not worried about a possible missile blitz tomorrow have allowed the prophets of Benson, Arizona, to run up quite a bill.

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INDIANS

Another nation today applied for - membership in the United Nations. No - not one of the new African territories. This nation - closer to home.

The Chippewas of Nett Lake, Minnesota. The chief of the Chippewas, getting out - some old treaties with the White Man. Treaties, signed by the great White Father in Washington - and recognizing the sovereignty of the Indians over their reservation.

Population of the tribe - seventeen thousand.

Survivors of the warrior nation - that once ruled so much of the mid-west. They claim they're a free nation - because Washington has recognized their sovereignty. They go on to say - their treaty rights are being violated. So they're now bick, These taking the case - to the U.N. The Chippewas - of Minnesota.

Off the coast of Massachusetts - they've discovered the wreckage of a ship called the "General Arnold". What's the story? You could almost guess - from the name. The ship, called after - Benedict Arnold - in the days before he became the traitor of West Point.

The General Arnold - went aground one hundred and eighty two years ago. A blockade runner - during the Revolution. Carrying food and refugees - through the British lines. The General Arnold slipping out of Boston - on a dark night in Seventeen Seventy Eight. Making a run - for the open sea. She got past the British ships - only to be caught by a storm year Plymouth Rock.

The gale, hurling her onto the mud flats. Where she went down. Covered by mud - for almost two centuries.

The mud, gradually washed off - by the Atlantic surf. The wreckage of the ship - coming to light. Now we know what happened to the General Arnold - blockage runner of the Revolution.
