GOOD EVENING EVERYBODY:

A school board has approved integration in the public schools - for the first time in the history of Virginia. The Norfolk School Board today bowed to the order of a federal judge - and agreed to enroll seventeen Negro children in white schools, for the coming term. But the board promptly asked for a year's delay - in actually enrolling the negro students.

It's still very doubtful - that the Norfolk schools will actually be integrated, when they open this fall.

Virginia has state laws that automatically close - integrated schools.

The Arkansas legislation adjourned its emergency session today - after calling for an investigation of alleged Communist influence - in the NAACP. Yesterday the state Senate had rejected the bill. But during the night, Governor Faubus got in touch with the Senators who had voted "No". He urged them to vote for the law - which they did today. The lawmakers appropriated twenty thousand dollars - for the state Attorney General to use to investigating investigate the NAACP.

The legislature also received a bill - that would prohibit the transfer of Little Rock students, after school opens. This bill was not passed today. But it could be approved any time - since technically, the legislature remains in its special session - until January. Passage of the measure would prevent - Negro students from transferring from segregated schools - back to Central High.

Another aircraft carrier of the U.S.Navy -- is on its way to the Formosa Strait. The "Midway" has sailed from Honolulu - to join our Seventh Fleet. She'll bring our total strength in Formosa waters - up to fifty-three combat ships. With six of them - aircraft carriers.

At the same time, a new order has gone out to

American jet pilots based on Formosa. They're now instructed
to chase Communist planes that attack in them almost clear
across the Formosa Strait.

The United Nations will not send either a "peace force" or an observation group to patrol the borders of Jordan. That's the statement in Amman - following Dag Hammarskjoldsthree-day visit to the Jordanian capital. The Secretary General of the U.N. conferred with both King Hussein and Premier Rafai. And the joint communique issued at the end of the talks rules out either a "peace force" or a border observation group. We are told that neither would serve the purpose - that the General Assembly had in mind, when it sent Hammarskjold to the Middle East. We are not told whether any agreement was reached for positive U.N. action in Jordan.

In Beirut, the government announces that America has granted Lebanon - eighty million dollars in aid. The sum is intended to help that nation of the Middle East - over the hump caused by a general strike and then armed rebellion.

The strike and the rebellion together - have virtually paralyzed the economic life of Lebanon. One figure tells the story - Lebanon is losing six hundred thousand dollars a day - in trade revenue. Hence the need for American aid.

But our Embassy in Beirut describes the grant - as still under discussion.

I am still at Aden, here at the corner of bouthwestern Arabia, just across the Strait of Bab el Mandab
from Africa. Aden may be an almost perfect place for
taking a look at the rest of Arabia at this time. Our
American stake in this vast region is great, as you all
know - for under the sands of Arabia are oceans of oil,
equal to all the oil - that is all the known oil - in
all the rest of the world.

Arabia, and the lands bordering it that are involved in the present Near and Middle East oil and political turnoil, include an area as large as all of the U.S.A.

The political struggle out here is largely a struggle on the part of the oil poor have-not nations to get a share of the sudden wealth that almost overnight made the rulers of Iraq, Kuweit, Bahrein, and Saudi Arabia so fabulously rich.

All mixed up with this is the awakening of the Arabic speaking peoples and their desire to step up their standard of living, play a more important role in world affairs, and at the same time do something about the tiny but comparatively powerful new state of Israel that nearly all Arabs would like to destroy - and for whose existence they blame the British and the Americans.

Mostly they blame us.

The medieval state of Yemen is only a few miles across the desert and mountains to the north of us here at Aden. The last time I was here I flew, without the Iman's permission, over a remote part of Yemen. The same Iman, Ahmed Seif el-Islam is still on the throne - now an ill and worried man.

What part he played in the assassination of his aged father, the Iman Yahyah, in 1948, and three of his brothers who were beheaded in '48 and '55, we don't know for sure. But, if they hadn't lost their heads we know

he would have lost his. When his brother Abdullah was beheaded four years ago, the story is that it was brought to the present Iman Ahmed on a platter and that at the sight he wept for the first time since he was a child.

Yemen, you will recall, recently joined the new

United Arab Republic; combining with Egypt and Syria.

Does this put Yemen under Nasser's thumb? Apparently not.

For the Iman has allowed far fewer Egyptians in his country since he joined them.

How long will the present Iman hold his throne?

Evidently he doesn't dare go to Sanaa, the lofty city that is the traditional capital. He stays in the south at Taez, ten days by jeep, less than an hour by plane

In Yemen the traditional way is for the nation's tribal elders to pick the next Iman or King. The elders

There is a surmise on the part of some observers here in Aden that Saudi Arabia may join the United Arab Republic in the same loose way that Yemen has. Aden, by the way, is probably the most formidable fortress in the world. More so than Gibraltar. With tunnels and rooms through the volcanic peaks rising from the harbor here.

Today both sides involved in the Little Rock integration crisis - expressed seme optimism about yesterday's decision by the Supreme Court. Because the Justices deferred the case until September Eleventh - some members of the school board feel that the final ruling will not be in favor of immediate integration. They argue that if a ruling against them had been inevitable - it would have come yesterday.

That's the rea reason for at least a slight bit of optimism among them - as they left Washington for Little Rock.

But government attorneys are taking - the opposite

position. They believe the Supreme Court simply giving the
school board every possible chance to present its case.

Solicitor-General Lee Rankin calls it "inconceivable" - that
the Justices will uphold the stay of integration - after they
have heard the pleadings on both sides - on September Eleventh.
