Latest from San Antonio: A report today that former President Johnson has suffered extra heartbeats - also,
"transpent pain" in his chest and left arm. This said to be the result of a circulatory problem - reducing the flow of blood returning to the heart. Accordingly, doctors prescribing a pain-killer - as well as a drug to thin his blood. Lieut. Colonel Robert North - the former chief heart specialist - explaining that "our main condemn" now "is to try and prevent a full-blown heart attack."

With a mob of whites there - attacking three school buses filled with Negro children; battling state police - who eventually escorted the children to safety; finally forcing the closing - of newly-desegregated Lamar High School.

South Carolina's Governor M_C Nair - later called the attacks "unspeakable." Blaming the violence on segregation forces - who are still urging defiance of the law He also alerted the state National Guard - just in case.

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In Vietnam - a sharp-eyed U.S. airman today spotted
- and ground troops quickly captured - an enemy rice
cache probably the biggest yet uncovered. The find
containing an estimated one hundred tons of the precious
grain - enough to feed five Communist battalions up to three
months. This in an area near Tay Ninh City - the site of a
recent enemy build-up; also, the target of eight raids by big
U.S. B-Fifty-Twos - last night and early today.

Meantime, in neighboring Laos - North Vietnamese invaders were said to be mounting another offensive. At any rate, Laotian Premier Prince Souvanna Phouma - summoning his top military commanders to a strategy meeting in Vientiane. Trying to decide - whether to rush into threatened areas. Also under consideration - we are told - a possible request for additional U.S. weapons and military equipment.

Here at home - the U.S. was threatened today with a nationwide rail strike - called for Thursday. President Nixon promptly responding with a call for emergency legislation - aimed at averting the walkout. Thus becoming the third President in eight years - forced to seek Congressional help in settling a labor dispute in this vital industry.

For President Pompidou of France - a final press

conference today in New York. The French President saying

he was fully "satisfied" with his U.S. visit - despite a

rash of pro-Israeli, anti-French demonstrations. He also

said that he and President Nixon - had reached a "full

understanding of our respective positions;" coming

to the conclusion - said he - that "our views on basic issues

are the same - and our objectives are the same."

Pompidou then added that - true enough, there are certain differences with regard to specifics. But that is due in part - said he - to the fact that the "frontier of the Communist world" is only "two hundred miles from Paris."

And with that - it was "au revoir."

General Omar Bradley - the nation's only surviving five-star general - front and center today in Washington.

Sounding off on the threat of "imperial Communism" - which he called the greatest danger to modern America.

The seventy-seven-year-old General further expressed alarm - that many people, especially the nation's anti-war youth, have failed to recognize the peril. Said Omar Bradley: "We have neglected to impress on these youngsters - the fact that they now are responsible for maintaining their freedom."

Elsewhere in Washington - Lawrence F. O'Brien has reconsidered; agreeing today to return as Democratic National Chairman - despite the fact that he turned down the job only last week.

O'Brien's change of heart following a unanimous vote of the party's Executive Committee - urging him to "accept a draft" for the job. This, in turn, the result of a committee deadlock - blocking the choice of anyone else.

TREATY

The White House again -an announcement today with regard to the new world-wide Nuclear Non-Proliferation

Treaty. It's to take effect this Thursday - we are told - via simultaneous ceremonies scheduled in London, Moscow and Washington. A giant first step - in the quest for effective nuclear controls.

LEXINGTON

First Lady Pat Nixon - the victim of a brief

confrontation today with the so-called "strident

minority." Represented, in this case, by a group of about

sixty anti-war demonstrators - who were awaiting her

arrival at Lexington, Kentucky. The protestors shouting

over and over - "peace now, peace now." Drowning out

the First Lady's prepared speech - until they themselves

were shouted down by a welcoming crowd estimated at a

thousand.
