GOOD EVENING EVERYBODY:

President Eisenhower has ordered his top advisors to be on hand tomorrow - when the President and President-elect meet. After Senator Kennedy's arrival at the White House - he will have a private meeting with Mr. Eisenhower. At that same time, the presidential advisors will be in the Cabinet room - Secretary of State Herter, Secretary of Defense Gates, Secretary of the Treasury Anderson, and others. Their duty - to brief the next President on any affairs of state he may want to discuss.

DEFENSE

The revolutionary blueprint for our Defense Department that was made public today - might save Uncle Sam eight billion *Kennedy* a year. So says the Special Committee **established by** Senator Kennedy. Weaded by Senator Symington - who was Air Force Secretary under President Truman.

The chief proposal of the Symington Committee - is to do away with the three service Secretaries. Bring the Army, the Navy, and the Air Force - directly under the Secretary of This the committee Defense. This is considered necessary - because of the time factor. One Secretary being able to react more quickly than three - in case of a sudden attack.

The Committee also suggests getting rid of - the Joint Chiefs-of-Staff. **Hereould** replace them with a new planning body the put an end to inter-service rivalry.

SEGREGATION

Today's ruling on segregation by the Supreme Court is based on the laws governing interstate commerce. The ruling bars segregation in bus restaurants - if they are part of an interstate system. The specific case before the court that of Bruce Boynton, a student at Howard University. Boynton sued after he was refused service - at a Trailways Bus terminal in Richmond.

Today's verdict supports him. The vote of our highest tribunal - seven to two. Dissenting - Justices Clark and Whittaker. CUBA

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The latest Cuban leader to be arrested by Castro's police - is the man who presided over Castro's revolutionary tribunals. Major Sori Marin drafted the penal code - that caused hundreds of executions just after Castro seized power. "War criminals" were hustled off in batches - before firing squads.

But the Major gradually became disillusioned - with Castro's dictatorship. He was kicked into - the obscurity of minor army posts. Today, suddenly arrested - accused of counter-revolutionary activities.

CONGO

The latest violence in the Congo is centered in Kabala - a town in secessionist Katanga Province. Rampaging Baluba tribesmen, on the warpath - are massing in the jungle tonight, for an attempt to storm Kabala.

Defending the town - U.N. forces from Sweden and Nigeria. These forces killed over twenty Balubas today in local skirmishes. Tonight the Balubas can be heard shouting and singing - in the jungle. Wowing to take Kabala - and kill every U.N. soldier in the town.

But Katanga isn't the Congo's only trouble spot. There's more fighting in Kasai, more terrorism in Stanleyvillemore rioting in Leopoldville.

IDEOLOGY

The Communist manifesto published in Moscow - is what we expected. Khrushchev and Mao Tse-tung, trying to hide their ideological split - by calling for peaceful co-existence, with Russia leading the Communist bloc. But what did Khrushchev and his Chinese comrades say to one another - behind the scenes at their "Red summit meeting?" That's still a matter - of speculation.

PILOT

The tragedy of Claude Eatherly is that of a man tortured by his conscience - for something he didn't know he was doing.

Eatherly was in the Air Force - dri during World War Two. Almost his last assignment was to pilot a reconnaisance plane - for a bomber flying on Japan. Eatherly had no idea what this particular task was. He found out - when the atomic bomb dropped on Hiroshima. That inferno has haunted him - ever since.

The Air Force discharged him for - "neurosis with psychotic manifestations," Meaning - mental instability due to a morbid conscience. He was sent to a hospital - for Now he is reported treatment. New declarged AWOL. Claude Eatherly, disappearingapparently still trying to forget what happened at Hiroshima. ART

Our next First Lady is being criticized by The Fine Arts Commission. Weferring to - Mrs. Kennedy's plan to exhibit the works of modern American painters in the White House. Jacqueline Kennedy an art lover - who thinks we are producing fine artists, who ought to be better known.

To which Linton Wilson, of the Fine Arts Commission, retorts - "There's no room for an art exhibit in the White House," He adds the museum is the proper place for great paintings. Not the executive mansion - where they'll be inaccessible to most Americans. Surely The While House is not inaccessible. Who will win out - in this difference of opinion? Around Washington, the betting is X Mrs. Kennedy. It's taken for granted that as First Lady, she'll consult the Fine Arts Commission - and then make up her own mind.

AWARD

The Distinguished Service Award announced today in Washington - is posthumous, And, concerns a man - completely unknown outside the State Department.

His name - Henry Crooks. Sounds English - but Henry Crooks was a Frenchman who worked for the American Consulate in Lyons. He started back in Nineteen Nineteen - and was still on the job when he died last year.

His State Department record shows that in Nineteen Forty-One and Nineteen Forty-Two -- Henry Crooks gathered military information about the Nazis, and passed it on to our Consulate. When the Consulate was closed after Hitler's declaration of war - the Swiss took over for us, and Crooks remained at his post. He continued in the dangerous trade of espionage - for another six months. His intelligence means a consulted by General Marshall in drawing up strategy for the invasion of Europe.

Then - Henry Crooks was captured by the Gestapo, and Shipped off - to the notorious death camp at Buchenwald, where

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he was saved from execution at the last moment - by our army. Whereupon Crooks returned to his job - at our Consulate. Working there for another fourteen years - until his death. Now the Distinguished Service Award goes, posthumously - to Henry Crooks of Lyons, France. BYRD

A group of New Zealanders are going to erect a monument - to an American. You may have heard of him -Admiral Richard E. Byrd. In Wellington, they think it's about time to salute - the famous explorer who five times stopped off in the autipodes at the island bown linder, on his way to the South Pole.

New Zealand - the staging ground for the Byrd expeditions. The rendezvous - for men, ships, and planes. The jumping off place - for the final hop to the Antarctic; Leading to the establishment of Little America - and a whole new chapter in the history of South Polar exploration.

Today, Leigh Hunt of Wellington pointed out - that no individual ever did so much to further good relations between New Zealand and the United States. Hence, the new Byrd monument - to be erected on Mount Victoria, overlooking Wellington. Appropriately - facing toward the southwest. Admiral Byrd - facing the Antarctic. And here's Dick Noel - facing the Antarctic.

LIONS

Here's a sight to see from your car window on some highway - in the east. Mountain lions, cougars, the big tawny cats that used to abound in the forests of this country. Gradually they were pushed west - by the advanting frontier. Their habitat today - mostly in the Rockies.

But Bruce W_right of Canada's Wildlife Station reports mountains lions, moving east again. Reason - a rise in the deer population. Venison - the choice delicacy on the big cat's bill of fare.

So you're not seeing things - if you spot a cougar near New York or Philadelphia. In fact, one was seen recently between those two cities. A mountain lion - on the New Jersey State Parkway.
