Soviet Russia has invited the Chancellor of Austria-to visit Moscow. For the negotiation -of an Austrian Peace Treaty.

This, if it works, could remove one of the chief stumbling blocks in the way of high level negotiations between the Soviets and the West.

Yesterday, President Eisenhower called fox a conference of the Foreign Ministers of the Big Fouras a preliminary to a possible meeting of the chiefs of staff. All depending -on some evidence of Russian sincerity. More than once, the President has called for-deeds, not words. Among the deeds mentioned-a peace treaty with Austria.

Today, Soviet Foreign Minister Molotov had an interview with the Austrian Ambassador to Moscow. Handing him-a written document. And adding-an oral message, word of mouth.

The written message was a reply to an Austrian note, sent along ten days ago. The Austrian

Government-making inquiries about possible negotiations for a Peace Treaty. Answering thatMoscow demands guarantees against a union of Austria and Germany. Guarantees-against an Anschluss, such as Hitler put across, when he seized Austria. Today's Moscow note expresses the fear that the rearmament of West Germany might, in the words of the note, "engulf Austria." In addition, Moscow mentions terms for the withdrawal of all Foreign troops from Austriar, British, French, American, and Russian. So that was the written communication which Molotov today, handed Austrian Ambassador Bischoff. Along-with an oral statement. In which he is quoted as "taking into consideration that it is desirable to establish personal contact between Austria and the Soviet Union;" said Molotov, "the Soviet Government will welcome the arrival in Moscow of Chancellor Kab, as well as other representatives when the Austrian Government might desire to send
for this purpose."
So that's today's development-following President Eisenhower's call for a conference of the Big Four.

The position of the West, all along, has been that there could be no top level meeting with Soviet Russia-until the ratification of the Treaty for the rearmament of Western Germany. So, what have we along that line?
Well, today West Germany took final action

President Heuss-completing the German ratification, by signing the documents.
In Paris, today, Premier Edgar Faure
threatened to resign-if the French Senate fails to ratify. The debate is on-and Premier Faure made an impassioned address. Staking the life of his Government on-ratification. This is the final Parliamentary action required-in the question of the West German Rearmament Treaties.

Preisdent Eisenhower will have talks next week with top Congressional Leaders -on the subject of a four-power conference. Today the President issued the invitation for two meetings at the White House.
On Wednesday, he'll foregather with

Democratic and Republican leaders in the House of Representatives. On Thursday-leaders of both parties in the Senate.

This invitation followed a statement by Senator Knowland of California, Gap, leader in the Senate; Tho warned-that a four-power conference of the heads of state might hurt, rather than help, the cause of Peace. The Senator was not opposed, in any definite way. His caution was-that the Western Powers had better have a good understanding among themselves before-going into conference with Soviet Russia.

## SUBSTITUTE-LONDON DISARMAMENT

The Soviets offer- a major proposal of policy in the question of disarmament. If-the West will drop the plan to rearm Western Germany. So announced in London tonight-where disarmament talks are on.

Moscow is now willing to join in an
agreement to reduce "conventional" armament. Without demanding the simultaneous abolition of atomic and hydrogen weapons. Hitherto, the Russians have insisted-that there con be no discussion of disarmament, in general. Without-an agreement for an atomic ban. So this is a decided reversal. However, the offerhas tacked on to it-a clause which would veto West German rearmament. Which the Soviets have been trying to stop-all along.
Belgium is having disorders-riots all over
the country. (Because of a question of-schools. The Belgian Government subsidizes education, and most of the schools are Catholic.) A Socialist-Liberal regime is in power at the moment, and they voted-to cut subsidies to Catholic Schools by some ten million dolíars.

That's what causes the trouble-students going on strike, staging demonstrations. Battling the police-threatening a "march on Brussels." Many students injured-scores arrested.

This Nation has lost one of its veterans
of Public Life John W. Davis. At Charleston, South Carolina, today, he fell victim to pneumonia-at the age of Eighty-One.

John W. Davis-who ran for President
against Calvin Coolidge in Nineteen Twenty-Four.
Unsuccessful candidate on the Democratic Ticket-after which he continued an eminent career as a
constitutional lawyer. A foremost authority-in
questions of Government and law.

He argued more cases before the Supreme Court than any other lawyer.

## Another prominent figure - and friend - has passed -

Paul V. McNutt. Once - considered a prominent possibility for the Presidency. He was Governor of Indiana - then was American Chief in the Philippines, His Presidential prominence was during the Roosevelt Administrations - and he might have had the Democratic nomination if - F.D.R. hadn't run for a third term. In recent years he was associated with the legendary C.V. Starr and his Far East insurance empire. Paul V. McNutt died in New York - at the age of sixty-four.

All France, today, honored an anniversaryand no wonder. This being-an era of the wonders of science. And-the wonders of science fiction. Today is the fiftieth anniversary of the death of Jules Verne.

In Paris-a big parade, with floats depicting Jules Verne heroes and their exploits. Like"the trip to the Moon", "Around the World in Eighty Days". Prominent, of course-Captain Nemo and his memorable submarine.

Over here, in this country, we've been
having an impressive tribute to Jules Verne. The U. S. Navy-naming the first atomic submarine "The Nautilus." Which was the name of the wondrous undersea craft commanded by Captain Nemo. In-"Twenty Thousand Leagues Under the Sea."

Writing stories back in the Seventies, Jules Verne foreshadowed a remarkable number of scientific miracles, which have come to pass. The father -of the science fiction of today, he was a quiet, secluded character-who lived almost the life of a hermit. But, in his imagination there werestarting wonders.

In India the police have launched an all-out campaign to capture-Man Singh. Listed-as India's Public Enemy Number One.

Man Singh is a bandit-accused of four -hundred-and-three murders and some two thousand robberies. With his marauding gang, he lurks in the jungles of North Central India. A sort of "Robinhood" character-backed by the sympathies of local villagers.

The criminal tribes of India are a wicked - from whence comes onward thing. legend. Like-the Thugs of old, But Man Singh is a member of the Rajput caste, the famous warrior tribes of Indian history. His family-land owners. But Man Singh got into a blood feud-leading to a series of murders. So he took to banditry.

He's described as-intensely religious. A
devotee of Hanuman, the monkey God, also-of Kali, the terrifying Goddess of Destruction.

> They say that, last year, Man Singh took
a desperate chance- traveling in disguise, to Allahbad. To bathe-in the Holy Ganges. The police were tipped

off to this, and knew he was there-but couldn't find him in the enormous crowd, The hundreds of thousands of worshippers-swarming on the bank of the sacred river.
Now, an enormous manhunt-but they haven't caught Man Singh.
Now-a romance of the desert. A young
couple eloping-fleeing from the wrath of the girl's father. Taking refuge-with a Bedouin Tribe, far away among the eternal sands. The bride-the daughter of the Dutch Consul in Aleppo. The groom-the son of a Moslem Judge.

Dutch Consul Boche is a Roman Catholic,
and he vowed-his daughter, Nicole, would never marry a Mohammedan. File took her away-on a visit to Turkey, Thetas three years ago. Then, last yearhe placed Nicole in a school at Beirut. All the while, Ride Yamlikha was trying to learn where Nicole might be. A month or so ago, he found out. He went to the school in Beirut. Nicole stole away-and went off with him.
