The anti-slavery society notes that the price of brides has gone up - post-war inflation everywhere. In the Southern Sudan, the price is in terms of - spears. Before the war, a wife cost twenty marks spears. Now - fifty spears. In Uganda, the price of a bride is five cowe, fifty goate, and about three dollars in cash.

On the basis of the report, it's no wonder that the old anti-slavery society still goes on.
