### WHITE HOUSE

About the Carswell matter - President Nixon takes the offensive. Sending a letter today - to Republican Senator Saxbe of Ohio, in which he sharply attacks those in the Senate - who are opposing the Judge Carswell nomination to the Supreme Court. The President calling their efforts an attempt to deny him - the President - the same right of decision that was "freely accorded" past Presidents of both parties. He also said it places in extreme jepardy - "the traditional Constitutional balance" between the Executive and Legislative branches of Government. Adding, finally, that Judge Carswell still has - his total support.

As a result - Senator Saxbe promptly announced that he himself - will also back the Carswell nomination. Republican Senator Cook of Kentucky - also joining the pro-Carswell forces.

### PARIS

In Paris, the French Government warns that recent developments in Laos and Cambodia now threaten to spread the Vietnam conflict to the whole of Indo-China. The French are urging negotiations "by all interested parties with the hope of setting up a neutral and peaceful zone" to include all of Indo-China - the entire Peninsula.

## VIETNAM

Meanwhile, in Vietnam - ground action today was the heaviest in weeks. Marking the start of what appears to be - another major enemy offensive. One that has already cost allied forces - about a hundred men. The casualty list including Brigadier General William R. Bond -Commander of the U.S. One Hundred-and-Ninety-Ninth Hight Infantry Brigade; the Fifth American General to lose his life in the Vietnam war. The Viet Cong paying dearly their loses put at over, four hundred.

## WHERE DALAI LAMA LIVES II

Greetings Warren and good evening everybody.

I've just returned to New Delhi from the Dalai Lama retreat in exile at Dharamsala in the Western Himalayas that's only a few miles east of Kashmir. Some Eighty Thousand Tibetans including the Dalai Lama as you know succeeded in escaping over the highest mountain range on earth, when the Reds invaded their country. They tried to get along with Mao's people - tried for nine years to do it from the time of the invasion until Nineteen-Fifty-Nine. Then just eleven years ago on March Seventeenth, the Dalai Lama, in disguise, slipped out of Lhasa and made his thrilling flight to India through wild country, over dangerous trails rarely even used by the Nomads.

Of Tibet's Five or Six Million people only those Eighty Thousand have gotten across the Himalayas and Four Thousand of these are in the small border states of Bhutan, which is virtually a Tibetan province or was. A few more than that are in Sikkim - you know, where Hope, the

American girl, is now the Queen. Seven Thousand are in Nepal, maybe more. I recently visited their settlement and therest, over Sixty-Thousand are here in India in a dozen areas. For those in India, it's no Garden of Eden - not India. They are rugged people accustomed to high altitudes för up on the Central Asia plateau.

At Dharmsala, where I have been with the Dalai Lama - it's only six thousand feet. It is surrounded by great snow capped mountains. But these Tibetans are used to living at Thirteen-Thousand, Fourteen, Fifteen, Sixteen, even Seventeen Thousand feet. And they don't like the heat of India a bit. And they hate the monsoon rains that drench this side of the Himalayas. But outwardly they are just about the happiest people in the world. Surely they laugh the most. Even the Dalai Lama with all the sorrows and all the burdens that he has to bear - including the worry of the Genocide that the Chinese Reds are now practicing in Tibet, trying to wipe out the people.
