The General adding that talk of a planned slaughter - is nothing more than "vicious and malicious propaganda". Later he did accept - an offer of Red Cross aid.

Meanwhile, advancing Nigerian troops captured today a long sought jungle radio transmitter; the one that served as Radio Biafra during the last months of the war. Along the way - we are told - his transmitter were accepting the surrender of thousands; hungry Biafran soldiers -- yielding at last to the inevitable.
