Washington it is pointed out that such high-level meetings

aren't arranged with such haste unless they are definitely

of an emergency character...and the threat of war along the

Syrian-Turkish border seems to be that crisis.

MOSCOW

Today, the hostile blasts from Soviet Russia continued. The Moscow Radio charging - that the American Sixth :
Fleet is massing not far from the borders of Syria. Creating
a situation that, in the words of the Moscow Radio - "may have
the most dangerous consequences for international life."

In Washington, the Nævy Department states the Sixth Fleet is not massing near Syria, or anywhere in the eastern Mediterranean. Exactly - to the contrary. The warships of the Sixth Fleet are spread in small units from one end of the Mediterranean to the other. Most of these units - expected to make routine calls, tomorrow, in ports all the way from Spain to Turkey.

But Soviet Russia is rejecting all denials, and continues to repeat that armed forces of Turkey are preparing to attack Syria. Turkey - backed by the Western powers.

It's not easy to guess/what Moscow may be up to with all this agitation about mythical plans of warlike action
against Syria and its alleged pro-Communist government.

At the U.N., the American delegation, today
into the whole Syrian crim
expressed full approval of an inquiry by the General Assembly.

Concerning the Syrian Soviet accusations against Turkey and
the United States. The Syrians and the Russians in have asked
the General Assembly to take up the matter, and today the
American delegation stated: "The United States favors a full
and free discussion of the problem. We are ready and willing to
talk about it."

The British delegation at the U.N. gives its opinion in the following words: "In our view, there is no danger at all of Turkish aggression against Syria. It appears to the United Kingdom delegation that what is needed in the Middle East is a period of calm, not a succession of alarms alarums and excursions artifically created for purposes of propaganda."

However, the U.N. is moving in a leisurely way, and the debate in the General Assembly is not likely to begin before Tuesday next.

In Damascus, today, there was a conference between the Syrian Foreign Minister and the Turkish envoy. In which an official denial was given - that Turkey plans an attack on Syria. Government sources in Damascus say the Turkish envoy delivered a diplomatic note from his government - setting forth the denial.

Egyptian report - that the Syrian army has been ordered to has placed the army on alert and mobilize. But/it is revealed that weapons have been distributed among the villagers along the Turkish border.

Armament for popular resistance, if there's a Turkish invasion.

So says the Syrian government.

West Germany will krak break diplomatic relations with Yugoslavia - because of the Yugoslav recognition of Communist East Germany. At Bonn, the understanding is that Chancellor Adenauer and his Cabinet came to this decision at a meeting, today. The break - to be announced, officially, tomorrow.

There was plenty of concern in the West when.

Yugoslav Marshal Tito extended recognition to the Communist

East German regime. West Germany - now taking drastic action.

If Tito recognizes the East German Reds - West Germany refuses to do diplomatic business with Tito.

The Yugoslav President
TMAND is, of course, a Communist who broke with

Stalin - and, in West Germany, there was an argument that a

severance
Index of diplomatic relations might push Yugoslavia closer to

Moscow. But the Adenauer Cabinet is described as feeling
that Tito's Yugoslavia has already gone a long way back to

the former tie with Soviet Russia.

In Washington - more talk of a tax cut. Republican

Congressman Simpson of Pennsylvania called on Congress, today,

to bring about a reduction of taxation next year. Congressman

Simpson admits - there may have to be more money for national

defense, as a result of Soviet missile-satellite progress.

But he thinks that a hike in military spending could be offset
by reduced expenditures elsewhere.

This Republican call for a tax cut would seem to be contrary to the views of Vice-President Nixon - who said, on Tuesday, that the requirements of national defense must be placed ahead of any reduction of taxes.

Incongress, a Committee is beginning an investigation of what are called "regulatory commissions". That is, government boards which regulate branches of business, like the Civil Aeronautics Board, the Federal Trade Commission - and so on.

There are six of these - and, today, Congressman Morgan Moulder, a Missouri Democrat, announced an inquiry of gifts. Forty top officials to be queried - had they received presents or loans or fees from industries they regulate.

This draws a quick protest from the top ranking

Republican member on the Committee, Congressman Joseph O'Hara

of Minnesota. Who says - there's no evidence that anybody got

any gifts. And adds: "Never before has a Congressional

investigating group started out - by assuming that everybody

is crooked."

There was a s riot at a U.S. military base in Japan, today. Two thousand Japanese - trying to storm their way through the main gate of the installation. Why? what did they They want The Americans to Stay, and Give Them Back. want? Their jobs,

American military forces are being withdrawn from Japan, and this compels a lay-off of Japanese employees.

Which they don't like - and there have been loud, angry protests. Culminating - in today's outbreak. Which Japanese police repelled - with difficulty.

The government reports that a million, five hundred Persons thousand paper in this country have been stricken, thus far in the epidemic of the Asiatic flu. Which total follows the addition of three hundred and sixty thousand new cases, last week.

The number of deaths from flu and pneumonia - some five hundred. Which is, of course, a tiny percentage.

The U.S. Health Service declares that the flu has now spread across the country - reported in every section. Particularly - the South.

Schools continue to be hard hit, and a number of weekend college football games have had to be called off.

Because of players - laid up with flu.

Back in World War Two, there was a big job of engineering along the highway to Alaska. The Army, drawing a bridge - across the Peace River. The twenty-one hundred foot span costing - four million dollars.

Sputnik and company were over the South Pacific, east of
New Zealand. So the object observed by Dr. Patterson at
Newton, Massachusetts, last night may be the nose cap of the
rocket - træveling in an entirely different orbit.
