MOSCOW

The shock waves from the boming of that Soviet cultural building in Washington - a source of growing agitation today on both sides of the Iron Curtain; especially in Moscow - where the Kremlin promptly rejected an American apology. Instead - filing a "very strong protest." Also, a number of additional delegations of Soviet citizens - visiting the U.S. Embassy in Moscow; continuing to protest alleged acts of "Zionist hooliganism" - directed against Soviet diplomats and others traveling in the U.S..

STATE FOLLOW MOSCOW

Here at home - the U.S. State Department today condemned the bombing; calling it an act - which "can only sicken and dismay all law-abiding citizens." At the same time, ordering a twenty-four-hour guard - on all Soviet buildings in Washington.

Various Jewish groups - quickly joining in the condemnation. Dr. William Wexler - international president of B'Nai B'Rith - for one, calling the bombing -"a reprehensible act of terrorism;" adding that it "can only exacerbate the plight of Soviet Jews - and provide another pretext for Soviet harrassment of American officials in

Moscow. "

SAIGON

Turning to the war front - U.S. Defense Secretary Melvin Laird arrived today in Saigon. Meeting first with General Abrams - also, U.S. Ambassador Ellsworth Bunker; who will join kim later in talks with Admiral Moorer, Chairman of the Joint Chiefs of Staff - and Admiral Gram, the U.S. Pacific commander.

One subject almost sure to come up - if it hasn't already - me the possibility of a U.S. airlift to Cambodia; to bring in oil and gasoline supplies - to take the place of those cut off by Communist forces.

PHNOM PENH FOLLOW SAIGON

Speaking of which - the government of Cambodia today ordered the rationing of electricity in Phnom Penh; Waming a shortage of diesel fuel - to run the city's generators. This in addition to gasoline rationing - which has been effect since last month.

Meanwhile, three battalions of Cambodian troops attempting to break an enemy hold on vital Highway Four; the road that leads to the country's only oil Fefinery - at Kompong Som. However, the Cambodians advancing just so far - fand then they beat a hasty retreat. An Army spokesman saying - the Communists were "on all sides of us and behind us - like a bull's horns."

JERUSALEM

In the Middle East - at Jerusalem - U.N. special peace envoy Gunnar Jarring met today with Ismaeli leaders - Premier Golda Meir, Foreign Minister Abba Eban and so on. Abba Eban later telling reporters: "I feelvery good about the talks." And he added that Jarraing's visit - had proved "very useful."

AMMAN FOLLOW JERUSALEM

While this was going on - Arab guerillas reporting a new outbreak of violence in Jordan. Charging that King Hussein's armored forces - today attacked a Palestinian commando base north of Amman; apparently seeking to avenge the death of an Army soldier - who was killed earlier by commandos. The fighting said to have spread later - to nearby Jaresh. Whereupon Damascus radio called it all # of "a military conspiracy - mapped out in London, bart Waskington and Tel Aviv - to liquidate the Palestinian revolution."

The U.S. unemployment rate - up again last month. According to a government announcement today - hitting six per cent of the nation's total work force; the highest figure since Ninety Sixto One the first year of the Kennedy Administration. In part, because of a sharp increase in unemployment - among the ranks of highly-paid professional and iecanical workers.

Reverse side - Labor Secretary James Hodgson saying he hopes this will represent the high-water mark of the current business slump; in which case - said he - the jobless rate could well get down to four-and-a-half per cent - by the end of Ninety-Seventy-One. He also noted that the unemployment rate for Nineteen-Seventy as a whole - was four-point-nine per cent; which is bad enough - indeed, the worst since Nineteen-Sixty-Four. VATICAN

At the Vatican in Rome - another important step today in the liberalization of Roman Catholic doctrine. Pope Paul asking his bishops the world over - to study a recent recommendation from the Vatican's Department for the Discipline of Sacraments; a recommendation urging the elimination of obligatory confession - in all but cases of "grave" sin. Vatican sources adding the suggested new policy could become church law within a year - assuming, of course, the bishops approve. New York City - a meeting of international newspaper advertising executives; hearing today from Miles Kirkpatrick - newly-appointed chairman of the Federal Trade Commission; who charged that ads and commercials - are all to often "insulting to good judgement and taste;" also, "tawdry and calculatedly uninformative" - he continued; thereby arrousing - "suspicions and mistrust."

Kirkpatrick then going on to say - the government has no control in this area and certainly seeks none. But the fact remains - said he - "if the public's image of American business is an increasingly tarnished one" - then it must be due "in some measure to business' most visible product - it's own advertising."
