The big story tonight - still to come - as you no doubt know by now. President Nixon's eagerly-awaited report on Vietnam - set for broadcast shortly on most of these CBS Radio
stations. According to those in the know - an address that
could be the most significant of Mr. Nixon's career; though
what exactly he will say - still a closely-guarded secret.

The White House observing simply: "We have had full and complete consultations" with Saigon - and we "are in complete agreement."

Meanwhile, President Thieu of South Vietnam was
addressing a gathering of local officials today - near Saigon.
For what it's worth - Thieu asserting that "we arenear victory
over the Diet Cong. And he added. There is no reason for us
to lose to the Communist - now that victory is so close."

## MIDDLE EAST

to an end two weeks of fratricidal warfare - between the

Lebanese Army andArab guerillas. The truce following an
agreement reachedat Cairo - at the urging of Egypt's Coionel

Nasser. An agreement reportediy giving the guerillas a

Virtual carte blanche - to launch their attacks against Israel
from Lebanese territory.

As might be expected - Israeli reacton to all this -
something less than enthusiastic. As a matter of fact -

Jerusalem let it be known that any future gueri11a raids from Lebanon - would be met with swift reprisal. To drive home the point- Israeli jets today blasting a number guerilla positions in Jordan. Serving notice that official government policy is sti11 "an eye for an eye" - in Jordan, Lebanon or anywhere it's called for.

At the United Nations here in New York - the U.N.

General Assembly today opened its twentieth annual China
debate; with the first to take the floor - Ambassador Huot
Sambath of Cambodia - speaking in behalf of seventeen friends
of Red China; urgimgain the ouster of Nationlist China -
in favor of a delegation from Peking.

Next up - Nationlist China's Foreign Minister - Dr. Wei
Tao-Ming; who asserted that his government Stands as a
beacon of hope for ens1aved millions the standard-bearer of

Chinese culture and civilzation - the rallying point for free Chinese" the world over; wrere the "Communist regime has kept 1tself in power" - said he - "through torture and terror, surveillance and intimidation."

There will be more - much more - before the debate ends. However, observers saying the pro-Peking nations - again have virtually no chance of success.

You may have heard me say that the young

Australian patrol officers here in New Guinea make up
just about the most impressive group of young men in
all the world. There are five hundred of them here,
scattered through the jungle among a people who for
thousands of years have been living in the Stone Age.

In this area, the so-called Western Highlands, where
we are now filming the crew has been at work for months,
there are about a half a million of these Stone Age people,
broken up into small tribes and sub-tribes each at war
with its neighbors. Until recently if a man or a woman
went even five or six miles from his own village he was
almost sure to be killed - and eaten.

The young Australian patrol officers are
fast changing this. When ready to venture into an uncharted, uncrontrolled area, one of these rugged young

At Baden-Baden, West Germany - a meeting today of the

Internationa1 Society for Combatting Heart Disease; hearing
a straightforward address from a leading German heart specialist

- Dr. Berthoid Kern; who asserted that excessive agitation and lack of adequate rest - are the "sole important causes"
of heart disease. And all that business about excessive
weight, choiestero1 and cigarettes causing heart attacks a lot of malarkey - said he.

Dr. Kern then added that the sooner medical experts
recognize this fact - the sooner they'11 stop wasting money chasing miracle cures. Indeed, the doctor deciel that two out of every three heart victims could have been saved - if only they had received proper advice and treatment at the first sign of heart trouble.

Here on our own shores - a nationwide study of U.S.
health care - especially among the poor. Results - just
made public today before a Senate committee. According to

Dr. Lester Bresiow - president of the American Public Health

Association - the figures reflecting a set of circumstances
"that can only be called health brutality;" a brutality -
saidhe - that "pervades the lives of millions of Americans."

Among other things - the study showing: One - that
infant mortality rates in the U.S. - are higher than in
thirteen other countries; two - that non-white infant
mortality - is twice as great as with whites; and three - that poor $X$ families have three times more heart disease seven times more visual impairment - and five times more mental

111ness than others.

West Germany again - a rumored "royal romance" was
making headiines today at Stuttgart. The Daily Bild-Zeiting
pairing off Britain's nineteen-year-old Princess Anne - with

Germany's Prince Friedrich Von Schwartzenberg. Noting that the
two were seen together constantly - during the Princess'
weekend visit at nearby Sch1oss Langenburg Castle. This as a
guest of her aunt - Princess Margarete Zu Hohentohe-Langenburg.

Only trouble - the princepils deny it a11. A spokesman
for the German branch of the Royal Family - noting there were "other girls" present at the castle at all times. And $\sqrt{a}$ brother of the twenty-eight-year-o1d Prince was also heard to remark: "That is the eighth young man/that I have herrd Princess Anne is going to marry."

From Fort Hayes at Columbus, Ohio - the story today of a geriatric G.I.; First Sergeant Howpard D vis - at age seventy-two - the Army's oldest enlisted man on active duty; retiring from the service finally - after fifty-three years in uniform, off and on.
