From the world of science, the announcement.

polio virus has been isolated. For the first time, the virus which causes infantile paralysis in human beings has been identified.

The statement comes from Dr. Wendell Stanley of the University of California, head of the virus laboratory at Berkeley. He says the discovery was made after fifteen years of research by two colleagues of his, Dr. Howard Bachrach and Carlton Schwerdt.

The polio virus, now identified, is an immensely minute organism, a spherical particle about a millionth of an inch in diameter. Now that they've found it - they'll analyze the emical character of the tiny evil thing.

President Eisenhower's declaration today, on the subject of ex-President Truman and the subpoena - is worth looking at closely. I have a transcript of the news conference, in which the President expressed his disapproval of the notion of calling the former President before a congressional committee.

He said he didn't want to criticize Congress. But, as his own personal reaction - he would not have issued the subpoena.

A newspaper correspondent asked: "Mr. President - do you, yourself, feel that former President Truman knowing! appointed a Communist spy to high office."

The President replied - no, it was inconceivable.

He said he didn't believe that any President would knowingly damage the United States. He repeated the word - inconceivable.

The President also thinks that former Attorney

General, now Supreme Court Justice, Tom Clark - should not

have been subpoenaed.

As for the storm about Harry Dexter White, the

President said that Attorney General Brownell told him that

certain facts had come to light, which Brownell felt should

be made available to the public. They concerned a mrn named

White. The President didn't know anything about Harry Dexter

White. He told the Attorney General that, if he felt it his

duty to publish the information - why go ahead, and do it on

a purely factual basis.

President Eisenhower's disapproval of the Truman subpoena is echoed by top Republican leaders. They're against making a circus of an affair that serious. The committee on Un-American Activities is being criticized artitized for butting in. If ex-President Truman is to be questioned it should be done by the Senate Internal Security Committee. The satirical view being - that there's a rush to get in the headlines produced by the big sensation.

Today, Senator McCarthy of Wisconsin gave his

**pax opinion of that Eisenhower statement. He said the

President is just - "being a gentleman". Whereupon the

Senator proceeded to call ex-President Truman - a liar.

The Truman appearance is in/*** state of confusion tonight. With Democratic members of the committee on Un-American Activities declaring - it has been postponed.

Republicans on the committee deny this, and say the hearings will be held on schedule. However, some Republicans think - it would be better to hear from Governor Byrnes, before questioning ex-President Truman.

of how the former President will explain the whole thing.

He'll say that Harry Dexter White was transferred to the higher job on the international monetary fund, so that he could be kept on surveilance more effectively. That - he was raised to this other job, precisely because he was under suspicion of being a Soviet spy.

In that case, frm former President Truman would be confirming the statements made by Attorney General Brownell.

Former President Truman indicates that he will appear before the committee on Un-American Activities - and testify.

answer. He says he does not recognize, what he calls - "the right to command a governor to leave his state and remain in the city of Washington until granted leave by your committee to return. "If any such right were admitted, a congressional committee could summon the governors of the forty-eight states to Washington, and paralyze state administration." Sounds like South Carolina, talking up states rights.

Governor Byrnes has already stated that he and then-Fresident Truman, discussed the F B I report on Harry Dexter White. Who, nevertheless, was promoted. memorandum written by Secretary of State Byrnes to President

Truman in Nineteen Forty-Six -- Byrnes calling the President's

attention to the F B I report, sent along by J. Edgar Hoover,

Chief of the F B I. This tends to confirm the Byrnes

declaration - ** although ex-President Truman denies he

ever saw the F B I report, with evidence of espionage.

Attorney General Brownell says he is merely citing indications of "laxity" in the Truman administration, carelessness concerning Communism. He emphasizes that he makes no charge of disloyalty against the former President.

Committee on Un-American activities, declares that former

President Truman had "no greater access" to the FBI

information - that President Eisenhower, who wax was then

Army Chief of Staff. He pointed out that a copy of the

report on Assistant Secretary of the Treasury Harry Dexter
