~~In the Middle East - Jerusalem~~ The Israeli Parliament today approved by a wide margin--the new interim peace agreement between Israel and Egypt. This following a pledge from Israeli Prime Minister Rabin--that Israel will remain alert militarily pending final peace.

Rabin also pledging that the presence of U. S. technicians at Mid-East monitoring stations--will not create another Vietnam. U. S. participation will be only "in the service of peace"--said he; adding that "no American citizen must remain in the area--if fighting erupts."

DAMASCUS

Meanwhile, at Damascus, Secretary of State Kissinger was conferring ~~today~~ with Syria's President Assad, attempting to lay the groundwork--for a new second phase withdrawal ^{on the} ~~in~~ Golan Heights. But how successful he was--we'll have to wait and see. A U. S. official saying only--the atmosphere was somewhat "restrained."

Dr. Kissinger now heading home--to report to the President and to the Congress; where indications are--the pact will be approved.

Washington

AFL-CIO President George Meaney,--the main speaker today at a Washington meeting of the Seafarers International Union; ^{again} lashed out at Secretary of State Kissinger, ^{also} and Secretary of Agriculture Earl Butz; ~~The~~ ^{he chided} the first--for practicing a foreign policy of "appeasement"; ~~said he~~; the second--for filling the air with ^{what he called} "phoney gobbledey gook" about U. S. grain sales to Russia.

Meaney also taking Senator McGovern to task for saying labor should keep out of foreign policy. McGovern is a "farmer who wears suede shoes"--
^{Meaney;} said he; adding that "come what may--we're going to continue to have our say."

DETROIT

agreeing the fatal gunshot wound was self-inflicted.
