Washington's birthday was celebrated in Korea with a major U N offensive on the central front. The latest news pictures a massive pincers movement, which threatens to trap as many as a hundred thousand Reds.

An American column, spearheaded by tanks, drove to within two miles of that enemy base, eastern anchor of the Red mountain front. They stormed forward, behind a blazing curtain of artillery fire and air action - planes firing rockets and hurling that fiery terror called napalm, jellied gasoline. The Reds broke and fled, and American shock troops seized hill one hundred and sixty-six, The height that commands Hoengsong.

To the west, the anchor of the Communist front is the town of Pyongchang, which is now being assailed by two American divisions and one South Korean. At last reports, they were within three mxx miles of Pyongchang - the other jaw of the trap.

The statement was made in Washington today that Soviet Russia could atom-bomb the United States at any time. This, from retired Lieutenant General Harold George, who was head of the Transport Command in the Second World War. General George said - "There isn't xxx any doubt" that Soviet long range planes could strike across the North Pole and hit American industrial centers.

which also heard Lieutenant General Whitehead, head of the Air Defense Command. He said that, right now, his air defenses could not provide, what he called, a "minimum" defense of the United States. Because fighter planes at are not being produced fast enough.

Later, General Spaatz, former Chief of Staff of the Air Forces, recommended that we should have Exten a two-hundred-and-fifty-group Air Force - more than two-and-a-half times as large as the one that is now being planned.

(which said that "realistic" is preparations are being
made. The report states that it would be impossible
to kee hold all of the huge Alaskan torritory, together

British defense authorities declare that western scientists can provide full defense against bacterial warfare -- enemy attacks with deadly germs to spread epidemics.

In an interview today, Sir Ernest Rock Carling stated: "We now keep have efficient treatment for practically all the biological agents that can be used against us." He said that much of this is due to the American development of antibiotics - chemicals to check epidemics that might kee be caused by germ warfare.

We've heard horrendous tales about the ghastly threat of bacterialogical attack, but the British expert gives this assurance: "The development of anti-biotics has gone on at such a pace that we can cope with practically anything in that line."

In Paris, two mysteries were made public today - and they may be cases of Communist espionage.

Two sets of secret plans disappeared - and they may have been taken by Red spies.

Last Saturday night, an armament engineer parked his car at the house of some friends - and in the car were the blueprints of an anti-tank hand pregrenade, which was in the headlines last autumn. This anti-tank weapon was demonstrated before top military commanders of the Atlantic pact powers, and was said to penetrate armor twice as thick as that of the heaviest type of tank.

when the engineer completed his visit, and
went back to his car - he saw that the kex body of
the automobile had been jimmied open. The plans of
the anti-tank had grenade were gone. The police hope
the robbery was the doing of a common thief, who would
know nothing about the secret weapon. But it may have
been - Red espionage. The engineer has been arready,
charged with criminal reguligence.
Then, on Tuesday, another set of blueprints

vanished from an armament plant near Lille- plans of a new device for cannon, the latest gadget for artillery. An engineer left them on his desk at night and, the next morning, they were missing. (He notified the police, and a futile search was on - until today. This morning, the plans of the artillery gadget were found on the desk of another engineer. The supposition is that they may have been taken away, copied, and replaced - replaced, that is, in the wrong desk. Or, maybe it was the doing of some late worker, who moved

on the job, trying to discover whether all this mishaps to secret military papers were the doing of Communist espionage.

Tales told about the R F C continue - with more testimony today before a Senate Committee.

In Colorado, the authorities are investigating charges that a million dollar fire last weekend was ordered by big-shots of the gambling underworld. The place that burned was the swanky Wolhurst Saddle Club in Denver. Saddle might seem to have something to do with horses and riding. But, actually, it meant gambling - dice and roulette.

Two lives were lost in the blaze - and now the word is that it was all part of an underworld feud. They say that eastern gambling interests were giving orders to the Wolhurst Saddle Club, but these were defied. The saddle people refusing to obey orders from the east. Hence the fire that destroyed the Club. Today the word was that the underworld war might continue with gangland killings an in Colorado.

All this comes from Governor Dan Thornton, a millionaire cattleman who took office last month.

He says that, apparently, the gambling big-shots

were out to take advantage of the change in the state

administration, and build up a Colorado gambling racket - supposing that a cattleman Governor would be too green to know what was going on. But today Dan Thornton ordered a full investigation and said - gambling will not be tolerated in Colorado.

The basketball scandal spreads nationwide, with a former star of Colorado University telling how gamblers offered bribes and threats. Lee Robbins says that in Ninsteen Forty-Six the team came to play New York University at Madison Square Garden - and he was taken to a night club and entertained. He was offered five hundred dollars, and asked to ring in another Colorado player for a fixed game: He says the gamblers displayed guns and told him; "We don't fool."

But Robbins informed his coach, who in turn told Ned Irish, head of the Basketball Promotion at Madison Square Garden. Today Ned Irish said he couldn't recall any such incident, but officials at the University of Colorado confirm the story told by the former basketball star.

says he received a telephone call, offering him a
bribe to throw a game. Same thing in Washington, D.C.
where officials of Georgetown University state that
