In his first visit to a foreign country as President, Gerald Ford took off his coat in eighty plus weather and with Mexico's President Echeverria at his side - he marched through Mexican towns and streets lined with cheering thousands. After meeting and embracing Latin style at the border town of Nogales, in Arizona the pair decided to forego a bus ride and led a noisy procession into Mexico. As a sea of people closed around them. Mariachi music filled the air and fire sirens wailed - with a smiling President striding along and - at one point - waving both hands to hundreds of flag waving school children. The talks began later - dealing mainly with trade relations and Mexican migrant workers.

The Tapes testimony a heard in me federal court today a had former President Nixon telling John Mitchell last year to - quote - "stonewall it -- cover up, or anything else," if necessary to save the Administration from the the Watergate scandal. It was the fifth White House tape played deminstrate during the current Washington trial of former attorney general Mitchell and four other Nixon aides accused of conspiracy. It was also learned that new subpoenaes are expected for some other White HOuse tapes and documents. And today a Federal Judge temporarily barred the former President from transferring his tapes and documents to California, while granting him sole access to them except for an subpoenaed material while their future is determined.

For the first time, the leader of Palestine's liberation forces sat down today for talks with a western Foreign Minister. Palestinian chieftain Yasser Arafat meeting with French Foreign Minner Minister Jean Sauvagnavenes over breakfast at the French Ambasaador's walled residence in Beirut. At one point, their conversation had to compete with sonic booms - touched off by two Israeli jets streaking over the city. Afterwards the French minister told inquiring newsmen - "the way to end violence is to have the Palestinians assume international responsibility."

A late rally today sent prices soaring on the New York Stock Exchange - the Dow Jones Average gaining zooming fifteen points.

Across the nation more banks followed the lead of two major New York banks by cutting their prime lending rate to what is now generally eleven and one fourth percent.

National Airlines and the machinists union reached a tentative contract agreement today - ending the strike that lasted nearly one hundred days.

And the cencus bureau says that out of every seven housing units under construction last year, one was a condominium - and that, we are told - is a trend away from the traditional one family home.
