Thurs, Mar, 20-69.

War news today - a story of mounting Allied pressure; in Paris - also, Vietnam.

In the French capital - South Vietnam's Pham Dang Lam first up at today's peace parley. Accusing the Communists of
massing "many divisions" - for a threatened attack on Saigon.

Warning that such a "costly adventure" - could well jeopardize
the future of "these meetings."

Next - Henry Cabot Lodge for the U.S. Presenting a mass of evidence - to refute enemy charges that President Nixon is escalating the war. Lodge citing chapter and verse - in Hanoi's build-up toward its current offensive. Later reporting that for once - the usually talkative Communists were "not able to rebut" one word.

Meanwhile, in Vietnam - U.S. troops and tanks were attacking in force today. Destroying an enemy bunker complex - less than fifty miles northwest of Saigon. Those who survived the attack - in full flight when last seen. Putting still another crimp - in the Viet Cong's vaunted spring-winter campaign.

CAPITOL HILL

Here at home - Defense Secretary Melvin Laird - back
on Capitol Hill for the second straight day, Presenting
to Congress - the case for President Nixon's proposed
"safeguard" anti-ballistic missile system. Made necessary said he - by current Russian deployment of new, improved
Soviet intercontinental ballistic missiles. In the absence
of American ABM's - these capable of knocking out
substantially all" of our own Minuteman missles - said
Melvin Laird.

Looking ahead though - the Secretary called operation
"safeguard"- a potential "building block for peace;" on
the grounds, it will offer added incentive - for really
meaningful arms control talks between the U.S. and Russia.

HOUSE FOLLOW CAPTTOL HILL

Elsewhere on Capitol Hill - a House subcommittee

continued its Pueblo probe. Hearing today - from

Air Force General Seth McKee, who said he dispatched a

flight of plans from Okinawa - as soon as he learned of the

Pueblo seizure. Instructing his pilots to attack, if

necessary - to free the ship.

Only troub's - said General McKee - the planes were unable to reach the Pueblo before dark; by which time - the ship was already in port. The U.S. then taking the position - there could be no retaliatory attack without running the risk of war. As a result - the U.S. planes were finally diverted to South Korea.

Chicago - the grand jury returns. Indicting sixteen

The other eight - all Chicago policemen. Charged with infringing on the civil rights of various demonstrators - also, certain spectators. An offense punishable by up to a year in jail -as well as a fine of a Thousand Bucks.
