$x$ In the evening on that date. $x$. Roosevelt declined to declare a national holiday, saying that it would disrupt industry too much. But ill employers and all government agencies
re urged to make it easy for their employees to register. With this proclamation the President declared that "America stands ont the crossroads of its destiny. Ti e and distance have been hortened. A few weeks have seen great
nations fall. Therefore, the proclamation continues, we c:nnot renain indifferent to the ferocity and force now rampant in the worl. The terrible fate of nations whose wealmess invited attack is known to us all. So we must and will prevent our land from becoming the victim of agoression." Of course by no means all those sixteen and a half million who register October Sixteenth will become soldiers, our Army in peace time is never to become larger than Nine Hundred Thousand men. About Four Hundred Thousund of those who register will be enrolled into Uncle Sam's Army late this year. Their names will be drawn by lot.

There was joy in Brit i in today over that record bag of German planes wade by the Royal Air Force. The hundred and eighty-five $N_{\text {ai }}$ flying ships destroyed yesterday bring the total of Nazi raiders shot down since the raids began, up to two thousand, one hundred and sixty-eight. The highest
daily record before yesterday was on August Fifteenth, when a hundred and eighty-one Nazi were bagged.

Late today came the news that Eritish flyers had bombed the great Templehof Airport at Berlin for the second time. They also raided ruilway yards all over Germany. There were five air alams in London today, but the British say the raids were easily broken up. Berlin declares
that there were no mass uir attacks on Britain because Marshal Goering decided the weather was not suitable.

Sarlier in the duy, there was a report of a peasoup
fog over Dover. Over here we don't know exactly whether
those peasoup fogs would be suitable to an invasion or would make it prohibitive. At any rate, it wasn't tested because presently the wind came $u$ p to dissipate the fog.

Late this evening the British wer cabinet issued another warning, a belief that the Nazi invasion may come at any howse hour.
