TRAVIS-CLARK

Another twenty returning POW's - are scheduled to arrived shortly at Travis Air Force Base in California. After speeded-up processing - they will then be flown to military hospitals across the country; there to complete their long-awaited reunions - with wives and children, mother and fathers, and other loved ones.

An additional forty returnees - are also being processed even now back at Clark Air Force Base in the Philippines. And soon they, too, will be boarding "Freedom Flights" - heading back to the States. All this way ahead of schedule. A Clark spokesman saying: "The rapid pace was made possible, in large measure - by the returnees themselves; by their generally excellent physical condition - and high state of morale."

The returning men are newly-outfitted, for the most part - with mod clothes, watches, cameras and so on. TRAVIS-CLARK - 2

Appropos of the day, many also bearing Valentine gifts for those they left behind. Lieutenant Commander David Rollins of San Diego - perhaps explaining best the prevailing mood. "I have five years of Christmases, birthdays, and Valentine's Days - to catch up on" - said he.

CROSS LAKE-SAN DIEGO

For those two men who returned last night - the process of catching up has already begun.

Major Glendon Perkins flying today to Cross Lake, Minnesota - there to visit his ailing mother. The Major taking along his wife, Kay - with whom he was tearfully, joyfully reunited on arrival earlier at Maxwell Air Force Base in Alabama.

Meanwhile, Navy Commander Brian Woods of San Diego - becoming the first of the returnees to be reunited with his entire family. The latter watching in wonder as he consumed for breakfast today - six eggs, eight pieces of bacon, eight sausages and eight pieces of toast. Doctors describing his condition - as "running on sheer euphoria."

WASHINGTON-HANOI

From Washington - and Hanoi - a joint communique; spelling out today the results of four days of talks between Henry Kissinger and North Vietnamese officials. The two sides agreeing to form a joint commission - to supervise the rebuilding of North Vietnam; also, agreeing to "continue to have periodic exchanges of views - in order to ensure that the cease-fire agreement and its protocols are scrupulously implemented."

More than that - the joint communique disclosing a new-found cordiality. The U.S. and North Vietnam both pledging to "strive for a new relationship - based on respect for each other's independence and sovereignty, noninterference in each other's internal affairs, equality, and mutual benefit." The communique adding that "normalization" of relations between the U.S. and North Vietnam - "will help to insure a stable peace in Vietnam - and contribute to the cause of peace in Indochina and Southeast Asia."

VATICAN

At the Vatican in Rome - Pope Paul met today with Hanoi's Xuan Thuy; officially, at least - the first time the Pontiff has ever met with a North Vietnamese official. The two men - conferring about forty-five minutes.

As a result, the Pope arrived somewhat late - for his weekly general audience. He was in an ebullient mood though - announcing himself that he had just met with "a singular visitor, the representative of North Vietnam. He also said that Xuan Thuy had offered assurances - "that his people and his government truly desire peace." The Pope adding: "Thanks be to God."

WHITE HOUSE

Turning to the domestic front - a radio address from the White House. President Nixon discussing today the nation's environment and natural resources.

"Now, in Nineteen-Seventy-Three" - said he -"I can report that America is well on the way - to winning the war against environmental degradation." "Day by day" - he continued - "our air is getting cleaner; month by month our water pollution problems are also being conquered - our noise and pesticide problems are yielding to new initiatives - our parklands and protected wilderness areas are increasing."

The President adding: "Now is the time to reject the doomsday mentality - which says we are destined to pollute ourselves out of existence; now is the time to roll up our sleeves - and get on with the job." Toward that end, he pledged to resubmit to Congress - nineteen bills that were somehow stalled last year; bills that are badly needed said he - to complete our "unfinished environmental

business."

Reverse side - the President taking note of current fuel shortages. "We must face up to a stark fact" - said he - "we are now consuming more energy than we produce in America." The President saying he, therefore, intends to send to Congress - "a new and far more comprehensive energy message." In the meantime, suspending import quotes on home heating oil - east of the Rockies.

The President concluding: "America is a beautiful country. By our commitment to conservation, restoration and renewal - let us resolve to make America even more beautiful for the generations to come."

WALL STREET

After a brief time-out to regroup - money markets around the world were reopened today. The new devalued U.S. dollar - showing unexpected strength. Actually gaining a percentage point or two - in trading in West Germany, Belgium and the Netherlands.

For many though - the jitters still continue. On the London exchange, for example, the price of gold - hitting a record Seventy-Two Dollars and Thirty Cents; a one-day increase - of nearly twelve per cent. While here at home on the New York stock market - the Dow-Jones industrials plunging nearly seventeen points.

BEVERLY HILLS

Dr. Walter Herrman of the University of Washington one of those who pioneered in the use of "ovulation inducers" or so-called fertility drugs. The doctor is having some for thoughts - as witness a speech before a meeting of California obstetricians and gynecologists.

Dr. Herrmann observing that some women are infertile - because of psychological conflici. In the past he continued - such a woman could go to her doctor - find out there was nothing he could do for her - and then "go home knowing that she had done her best."

With the advent of fertility drugs - that's all changed - said Dr. Herrman. Adding that he fears children are now being born - to women who subconsciously do not want children and, indeed, should not have any.

Dr. Herrman stating, in short: "We have the ability to do it - now we're asking whether we <u>should</u> do it." For Comedian Jerry Lewis - as well as a young Australian golf fan - a harrowing experience today. It happened on the fifth hole of a pro-am tournament - preceding the start of the Tasmanian Open at Hobart, Australia.

Comedian Lewis hooking his second shot - into a crowd of youngsters standing about a hundred yards down the **comp** fairway. The ball hitting Michael Morgan, age eleven - just above the left eye. Jerry Lewis racing to the scene - by which time the boy was bleeding profusely; also, crying over and over - "I'm blind, I'm blind, I can't see."

Needless to say - an immediate end to the golf match. The story does have a happy ending though. Doctors later saying the boy suffered a bad cut - but nothing more. He'll be good as new in a few days - which is probably more than you can say for Jerry Lewis. In the State Legislature at Topeka, Kansas - a hearing on the merits of that still-pending equal rights rights amendment; bringing out Bible scholars - both pro and con. Representative John Bower - reading from the

Apostle Paul's letter to the Galatians. Paul saying: "There is neither Jew nor Greek - neither slave nor free - neither male or female - for you are all one in Christ Jesus."

Next - Representative Josephine Younkin, who said: "If you look in the Book Genesis - it says that God make woman in the image he wanted, not in the image of man;" which means - she went on - that "women should not be expected to be equal to men - in many ways."

It remained, however, for still another woman - to make perhaps the most telling point. Mrs. Grace Maderos saying: "The amendment is a slur on every wife and mother." Adding: "I've been lowered to equality - and I resent it." POW'S
