News from Soviet Russia - that a purge of the followers of Beria has begun. In the province of Georgia, Vladimir Dekanozov has been dismissed as the local minister of the interior. And - expelled from the Central Committee of the Georgian Communist party.

In East Africa, the Supreme Court of Kenya has ruled on an appeal made by Jomo Kenyatta, the who recently was burning spear, Sentenced to a harsh prison term - as the leader of the Mau Mau terrorists.
