For the second straight day - a full scale riot telining today in the Kowloon District of Hong Kong. With thousands of leftist workers - battling massed British police; in a teeming refugee district - housing more than a hundred thousand Chinese.

The rioters setting fire to trucks, cars and shops then trying to prevent firemen from reaching the scene.

Police fighting back with tear gas and riot sticks -dodging bottles and missiles thrown from surrounding
high-rise apartments. In the end - scores injured on
both sides -- and scores more are arrested.

Britain's entire military garri: on in Hong Kong including a brigade of tough Gurkha troops - now on
stand-by alert, Against the threat of mobs of Chinese still roaming the streets past midnight - in defiance of a
British curfew.

Reverse excalation - reported today from Vietnam.

Viet Cong raiders attacking in the dark - with the most

powerful rockets they have ever used in the Saigon area.

Blasting a pair of xx air bases that launch most American

strikes - against enemy targets inside South Vietnam.

A US spokesman later reporting - six killed, more than a hundred wounded in the rocket atack.

Also, two American jets destroyed - and lwenty-five more damaged.

At the same time - Viet Cong batteries to the North were launching an hours -long attack - against U.S. Marines bases near the D.M. Z./mortar and artillery shells pouring from hidden enemy gun emplacements - inside that supposedly demilitarized zone.

Dr. Martin Luther King) -- the mation's

forebook Civil rights leader) -- under fire today from

Senator Brooks of Massachusetts -- the nation's

Criticized

nighest elected Negro, for mixing anti-war sentiment -in the fight for Negro rights here at home.

Dr. King's anti-war stance -- "a tactical error -- strategically unwise" -- causing wholesale desertion from the cause of civil rights -- said Senator Brooks. Further asserting of Dr. King: "His advice to young men not to obey the draft laws -- is dangerous; his advice as to's cessefire -- which means our troops would have to stop firing -- is suicidal."

The Senator adding that he, too, favors every possible effort -- to bring about peace talks. But for now -- said he -- the needs of our men in Vietnam "must take priority;" and added: "funds for poverty and disease" -- must come from somewhere else. Perhaps the Space Program, -- said he.

Cold war confrontation in the Sea of Japan suddenly no ended today. A U.S. Navy task force - having
completed anti-Submarine maneuvers, as scheduled.

With Russian and American wx warships -- both returning
to friendly waters.

Back in Washington - the State Department today denying widespread speculation to the effect that Russian ships may have twice bumped an American destroyer - for some reason related to Vietnam. Nothing at all to support such a claim - said the State Department.

Be that as it may -- American and South Korean ships begin a two-day exercise tomorrow -- in the same area. And one thing is sure -- they'll be ready for anything.

The best possible kind of news today -- from Walter Reed Army Hospital. Word that former President Eisenhower -- is well on his way to recovery from that attack of gastroenteritis. Showing so much improvement -- in such good spirits -- that he may be going home this weekend; home to Gettysburg -- to complete his recuperation. General Ike proving once again -- he's a tough man to keep down.

John Masefield - Britain's poet laureate for thirty-seven years - dead today at his home in Abingdon, England. At eighty-eight - the victim of a lingering heart ailment.

John Masefield - the author of more than seventy books of verse, plays and novels. Who continued plying what he called his "trade" - right up to his final illness.

The great poet first to admit that he wrote so much - it couldn't all be first quality. Yet a eighty-three winner of the coveted William Foyle poetry prize; for "the Bluebell and other verses" - his twenty-seventh book of poems.

A sailor to kath begin with he gained perhaps his greatest fame - from the pact poem "Sea Fever". The one that begins: "I must go down to the sea again - to the lonely sea and the sky."

John Masefield - now an immortal.

children -- who said they saw the Virgina Mary of Fatima

-- fifty years ago tomorrow.
