America's triumphant surveyor spacecraft -- the toast of the universe today. A magnificent success -- first time out. Blazing a trail for men to follow -- in the continuing race for space.

As you no doubt have heard -- the Surveyor achieving a pin-point precision landing-- a soft landing exactly as planned -- in the socalled Sea of Storms right on the face of the moon. Then sending back a stream of pictures in its first few hours on the lunar surface. A stream that will soon become a flood of some ten thousand pictures in all -- with vital information -- for future manned flights to the moon.

And what pictures they are -- more and better by far -then those obtained by the Russians. Showing a flat, dusty
surface -- strewn with rocks and pebbles -- but clearly able
to support the weight of man.

Dr. Edward C. Welsh -- White House coordinator for the space program -- summing up official reaction in a single sentence. "It's not always getting there first that counts" -- said he "it's getting there best."

Next up -- the Gemini Nine -- we hope. Three times

postponed -- it's primed once more for another try tomorrow

morning. All systems "go" with astronauts Stafford and Cernan
said to be "intent and ready" to get the job done.

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SCRANTON

A political bombshell today - at Harrisburg.

Governor William Scranton of Pennsylvania -- a power

in the Republican party for the last four years
renouncing all future political ambition.

Governor Scranton - whose current term
ends in January -- announcing flatly: "I am not going
to run ever again -- for any public office -- under any
circumstances - and that includes being drafted."

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The end of a dangerous diet cult - decreed today by the Federal Food and Drug Administration.

Officials disclosing a lightning raid - on the New York headquarrers of a Zen group that sponsored the fad.

Federal agents seizing books, pamphlets and promotional literature -- as well as quantities of food on the premises.

The so-called "macrobiotic" diet - based on eating and drinking nothing but grain products. A procedure supposedly guaranteed to cure - more than eighty kidax diseases, including cancer, cataracts, polio, heart disease, hernia and leprosy.

The government crackdown following the death of four adults - who followed a rigid macrobiotic diet.

Also, an infant child -- whose parents fed him nothing but a cereal water mixture -- from the day he was born - until the day he died ten months later - of mainutrition.

Political developments today in strife torn

Viet Nam -- both good - and not-so-good. A government

armored column seizing the Buddhist stronghold of Hue
without firing a shot. This followed, however, by a sudden

question - whether the occupation force was really loyal

to Premier Ky.

Meantime, militant Buddhist leader Thich Tri

Quang -- apparently trying to keep the pot boiling. Accusing

President Johnson 20x2 of so-called "evil intentions and

lack of respect" -- for his recent speech deploring flery

suicide in Viet Nam. Adding to the confusion - another

massive Buddhist demonstration today in Saigon.

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UNITED NATIONS

At the United Nations -- a formal request today from South Viet Nam; for the presence of U N observers -- at Vietnamese national elections now set for September. The request presented verbally to Secretary General U Thant -- by South Viet Nam's observer at the U N who promised to put it in writing - as soon as possible.

The Secretary General himself -- refusing comment on the move. For that matter - U N observers noting a Thank speech only last weekend, contending that he could not see the use of U N supervision, in Visinamese election's - at least, "at this time."

The request, nevertheless, significant. In that it marks the first time Vietnamese authorities - either North or South - have requested U N participation in their internal affairs.

Swift and final retribution today - at

Leopoldville. One by one - four men walking to the

gallows, there to die -for plotting the murder of

President Joseph Mobutu. The bodies of former Premier

Evariste Kimba and three of his ex-cabinet ministers
left hanging for twenty minutes - before they were finally

cut down.

The day a national holiday - by government decree. Some eighty thousand speciators on hand - for a dramatic demonstration of the fate that awaits Origo potential traitors. But there was - no cheering. Instead, eerie silence - broken only by the cries of fretful children, And a massive gasp - each two time the trap was sprung.

The Irish presidential sweepstakes -- neck and neck between veteran President Eamon Devalera -- and opposition candidate Tom O'Higgins. The newcomer cutting heavily into traditional strongholds of the eighty-four year old President -- one of the greatest vote-getters in Irish history.

However, at last report -- DeValera had a slim lead and is seemingly assured -- of a second term in office.

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Conservative Joaquin Balaguer and Leftist Juan Bosch -chief rivals in the Dominican presidential race. And with
the vote about half in -- Balaguer claiming victory on the
strength of a rural landslide. But Bosch -- who carried
the capital of Santo Domingo -- is refusing to concede defeat.

Result: Brigitte Bardot ordered to pay two thousand dollars - to cover costs and damages - incurred by the recording company.

The subject of hair -- a prime consideration these days, whit with boys who look like girls -- and glamour girls who rely on wigs. The trend duly noted today in a new study of baldness -- by Dr. Irwin Lubowe of the New York Medical College.

Like it or not -- says Dr. Lubowe -- more people are getting bald -- men and women alike -- all a part of the inevitable process of evolution. With what research there is centered almost entirely on the theory that baldness is hereditary. Will it one day be overcome by some new miracle drug? The doctor cites a half-dozen or more reasons for baldness -- other than heredity -- found in recent tests. Among them: Too few minerals -- or twoo much fat in the diet. Excessive hormonal activity -- Caused by gladular distrubance. Poisoning -- both internal and external. Emotional stress -and of course, disease.

The only constant factor found among all the test cases --

according to Dr. Lubowe -- was simply this: That baldness itself does increase nervous tension. And nervous tension in turn -- increases baldness. And s-l-u-t-m.

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
