jailed for destroying draft records in Baltimore back in Nineteen Sixty Eight. The FB I Director medias saying he feels broken; at least, not yet.

In the wake of that attempted attack on Pope Paul at Manila Airport - a quick beef up today in Papal security. Philippine police officials raising from three thousand to five thousand - the number of men assigned to guard the Pontiff's safety; hoping to make sure - it won't happen again.

In neighborning Vietnam though - death takes a holiday. The UN command in Saigon - reporting a third straight day without a single American combat death. Indeed, the total U S casualty count for the period - showing only eight wounded. According to at xbecome one U S officer - "just good luck."

In the Middle East - at Cairo - a report that Syria has finally agreed to join the new Arab Enfederation. Today's announcement following two days of talks - between Egypt's President Sadat and Syrian Prime Minister Assad. The Federation membership now numbering four with Libya and the Sudan filling out the group. The leaders of all four having agreed - we are told - "on the necessity of combined action in all political, and military and economic fields;" with their ultimate goal that of strengthening "the capabilities of the Arab nation in its battle of destiny against Zionist plans."
