## HURRICANE

Another hurricane -- brewing in the South

Atlantic. Not large, thus far -- or excessively violent.

But you never can tell how those tropical twisters as will grow. This one, named Edith, is blowing seven hundred and fifty miles northeast of Puerto Rico. Discovered by an Air Force reconnaissance plane, today. The new hurricane having appeared - suddenly.

Today, the American Bar Association observed - the bicentennial of John Marshall, most famous of the Chief Justices of the United States. A celebration - in Independence Square. Where stands - Independence Hall, signing place of that historic declaration. The guest of honor, today - President Eisenhower. Who made an address - in the same city where he launched his election campaign nearly three years ago.

The President spoke of our foreign policy. Sayingthat we are eager for everything to promote peace. But
we will not accept injustices - like the division of Germany,
the oppression of people in the Red satellites, or worldwide
subversion by the Communists.

"If we accept", said he, "a destruction of the principles of justice for all, we cannot longer claim justice for ourselves, as a matter of right."

ETSENHOMEK

We hear that President Eisenhower, next year, will call on Congress to cancel a proviso in the Immigration Law, the one - thet requires the fingerprinting of all "non-official" visitors to this country.

There have been complaints in Europe, where people think - it's humiliating, degrading. Not long ago, a group of Russian student-editors cancelled a visit across the Atlantic -- because they refused to be fingerprinted. The Soviet farm group, now touring this country, got around it by coming - as an official delegation. Which avoided - the finger-printing.

The subject came up, was we hear, during the Geneva Conference - in President Eisenhower's talks with his wartime comrade-in-arms, Marshal Zhukov. Who made the remark - that finger printing is for st criminals.

President Eisenhower answering - that he, himself, had been fingerprinted twenty or thirty times. And he didn't think it humiliating. Nevertheless, the President we hear -

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was impressed by the view of the Soviet Minister of Defense.

All of which would indicate a difference in susceptibility - here and abroad. Americans don't object, particularly, to being fingerprinted. In fact, J. Edgar Hoover of the F B I has been urging, for years - that all citizens have their fingerprints on record.

#### VOICE OF AMERICA

The Voice of America -- broadcasting from the Soviet Embassy. Where you'd think it would never happen. But it did -- tonight.

The Voice made a proposal. Offering -- to let the head of the Soviet farm delegation give a broadcast beamed home to Russia.

The suggestion was passed on to the Soviet Embassy which responded -- by inviting the Voice of America to the Embassy. So, that's what happened tonight. The Voice of America. Mataskevitch -- speaking. His broadcast report.

In general, a favorable picture of the American farm, as he and his colleagues observed it.

#### INDIAN AMBASSADOR

There's a curious th turn in the case of the Indian Ambaasador who was refused service in an airport dining room at Houston, Texas. Ambassador G L Mehta, and an Indian aide, ushered out of the public dining room. Then served - in a private room.

There was an uproar about that - and Houston, today, apologizes. Mayor Roy Hofheinz, of Houston telegraphing to Ambassador Mehta at Mexico City - and inviting the Ambassador to dinner in the Mayor's own home.

The odd thing is this: - In México City, Ambassador aids

Mehta says that, when he and his the were asked to have

their meal in a private dining room - he had no idea what it

meant. He didn't know - they were being discriminated against.

Thought it was a special hour.

He only found out - because of the uproar.

The government at Paris is faced with a right wing revolt - on the subject of North Africa. Conservative members of Premier Edgar Faure's majority Parliament are denouncing him - for the way he handles the savage crisis in Algeria and Morocco. Today, they demanded - that he all a special session of The National Assembly, to pass judgment on his policy The right wingers want drastic action - to suppress the murderous terrorism.

The Premier has been in conference at a town in Southern France - with Moroccan leaders. Hoping - to find some sort of agt agreement that will end the violence and massacre. This draws angry criticism. The Conservative members of his Parliamentary majority declare - he's compromising with leaders responsible for the reign of atrocity.

### PALESTINE

Egypt has broken off the talks - to reduce tension along the Gaza strip. Negotiations have been going on - seeking an agreement, which would end the violence and shooting. But now, following that latest border clash, in which several Egyptian soldiers were killed - the government at Cairo withdraws its delegates from the conference.

One point at issue is this. The talks have been held with the United Nations as an intermediary. U N Supervisor Major General E. L. M. Burns of Canada - acting as a go-between. Israel wants direct negotiations between its representatives and the Egyptians. But the Carro government refuses - insisting on messages conveyed through the U N supervisor. No direct dealings.

KILLING

There seems no explanation, bonight, of the murderous rampage in England. An Amagrican American airman - shooting up the Manston U.S. Air Force base. Killing three - and wounding seven.

Insanity, no doubt; - maybe some kind of paranoia.

The airman's name Napoleon Green. A curious name - reminding one of delusions of grandeur.

The airman from Chicago - a supply clerk, walked an into the accounting office at the base - armed with a carbine and an automatic pistol. Opening fire - without warning.

Killing - a U.S. Air Force Sergeant. Then, in awild flight he shot and killed a British Corporal and an American M P; wounding - a number of others.

He seized an automobile and drove to a nearby vacation beach, on the channel coast. People on the beach - in a panic.

Military pursuers closed in on him exchanging gunfire. He took refuge an a cliff - wounded. Then

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turned his pistol on himself - a suicide.

The murderous madness - of Napoleon Green.

ATOMIC

A big day at Harwell, Englands great atomic center.

Security regulations eased - for a visit by one-hundred-and-five nuclear physicists who attended the atomics for peace conference at Geneva. Forty-two of them - From Russia or other Iron Curtain countries.

They were taken on a tour through Harwell, and shown the latest in British atomic ar research. The physicists from the world of Communism say they were "very impressed."

Novolkov, Deputy Secretary General of the Soviet Academy of Scientists, who was asked about a thing that happened at Geneva, where, the British announced - they starting a twenty year atomic program which will supply half of the British needs for sizes electricity by Nineteen Seventy-five. This, at the time, drew some unfavorable comment from a colleague of Professor Novolkov, who said he thought the British were making "rask predictions."

Today, Novolkov was asked about that opinion -

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expressed by his Russian colleague. Did he agree with it?

Novolkov replied, briefly: "Id must have been

misquoted."

Take a snooze - at the edge of the cliff along the Gorge of Niagara.

Well, you know how it is when you're asleep - you're likely to turn over. Dunphy did - and down he went. Like McGinty.

TRUMAN

Today, former President Harry Truman said: "I sure hate to see the old place go. My grandfather bought it in Eighteen Sixty-nine."

The old place - the Truman farm at Grand View,

Missouri. Most of it now being sold. To become a suburban

development.

The former President relates - how, one-hundred-andten years ago, his maternal grandparents moved from Kentucky
to Missouri. Mr. and Mrs. Solomon Young - who, after a while,
settled on the farm at Grand View. H.S.T. was born in the
old farmhouse. And, as a boy, did the plowing. That was
where, as he likes to say - he learned to "plow the straight
furrow."

Which was the beginning of that fabulous Harry Truman career. Working on the farm - until he joined the army in Nineteen Seventeen, and went off to we war. Then, returning, he didn't go back to the plow. He became a haberdasher in Kansas City - shirts, neckties and suspenders. Then a

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politician - and on to the White House.

His brother - remaining a farmer. Cultivating the fields at Grand View. But now they've sold most of those acres, and it's like something out of "East Lynn," To hear Harry Truman moan: "I sure hate to see the old place go."
