Word from London tells of a proposal to be placed before the Chinese Communist delegation which is now on its way to the U.N. The Red representatives will br e be asked "how about a "buffer strip'." Include these in a demilitarized "buffer strip" administered by the $U N$ and garrisoned by Asiatic troops of the World Organization.
