POLITICS LT Sustaining Wed. Quy. 23-67,

A special presidential panel of at least nineteen prominent Americans - has agreed to travel to Vietnam next week. Purpose: To observe those South Vietnamese elections a week from Sunday.

The announcement today - from the White House.

Presidential Press Secretary George Christian

identifying the mission members - as Governors, mayors,

members of congress, religious leaders and communications

executives, who will be permitted to travel freely
throughout the countryside.

Christian emphasizing though that the observers
- are "not going to supervise," but only "to share an
experience with the Vietnamese people - when they vote."

More of the same - from Senator McGee of Wyoming; a self-admitted "Hawk" - in congressional debate on the Vietnam issue; who declared today that have lawmakers "have no alternative - but to support the President as he perseveres in Vietnam."

Senator McGee going on to say: "Clearly, it is not President Johnson who has stopped seeking peace -- it is Ho Chi Minh."

War in Vietnam -- marked today by a fourth straight day of U S air strikes -- against the Hanoi area. With this latest x\approx effort - perhaps the biggest yet.

Anywhere from four to five hundred U.S. plames -- reportedly taking part in the attack. Again smashing at bridges and rail lines - on the Communist lifeline to Red China.

Radio Hanoi later reporting -at least ten American planes shot down. Also claiming that "many" pilots -- had been captured. However, no confirmation as yet - from American sources.

PENTAGON

Here at home -- a young Army Sergeant from

Ohio -- today named the eighteenth Medal of Honor winner

in Vietnam. The announcement - from the Pentagon, Where

Staff Sergeant Jimmy Stewart of Racine, Ohio - will be

honored pour posthumously in ceremonies tomorrow.

Sergeant Stewart, a brove man who died defending five wounded comrades in a jungle battle. Single-handedly holding off a force of Viet Cong for four hours - before he himself fell to enemy fire.

Meanwhile, continued Semate hearings today on U.S. bombing policy in Vietnam - defended anew today
by Admiral Moorer - Chief of Naval Operations;
who stressed the precision of U.S. bombing raids - in
carefully controlled target areas of North Vietnam.

Purpose - said he: To prevent "expanding the war - to include Communist China or the Soviet Union."

Also to ensure "minimum casualties - to the civilian population."

Of necessity - these restraints mean that "the enemy has also been provided some sanctuary;" particularly around Hanoi and the fort of Haiphong -- said the Admiral. He added, however, that the air campaign has "recently been enhanced -- by the assignment of additional lucrative targets." And the air war over-all has been "prosecuted in an effective manner" - said he.

KREMLIN

At the same time - the United States today accused of waging aggression in Vietnam -- "ever more exe extensive and sinister in nature." This in a Kremlin statement -- carried by the official Soviet News Agency Tass. Protesting U.S. bombing of the Hanoi area - as well as what it called recent "intensification of the war against the Vietnamese exect people."

Said Tass: "The danger of this short-sighted course--lies in the fact that it further aggravates the international situation -- and may bring the world to a dangerous point." The reason - Tass concluded - "because every new step to escalate the war in Vietnam -- inevitably leads to the necessary reply steps" from the Soviet Union.

Reverse side - from New York. Where Senator

Robert Kennedy -- today bitterly criticized U S policy

in Vietnam. Decrying increased involvement of American

fighting power - calling the South Vietnamese election

a "fraud" -- and urging an end to U.S. bombing of the

Communist North.

American people - have a right to expect much more of the South Vietnamese people. Said he: "With so many of our Marines being killed and wounded in the demilitarized zone - I would like to see more of the South Vietnamese up there defending their own border." The Senator charging, what's more, that "the American casualty rate" in Vietnam - "is higher than the Vietnamese draft call."

In support of all this - Ssenator Kennedy
quoting a remark by his late brother; in effect -disassociating the Kennedy administration from the course

of present U.S. policy. The late President Kennedy said to have asserted of the South Vietnamese people: "It's their war - all we can try to do is help them."

Next up - Chairman Fulbright of the Senate

Foreign Relations Committee; who today all but killed

a promised one-man attempt - by Senator Morse of

Oregon -- to repeal the Gulf of Tonkin resolution.

Senator Fulbright saying he is convinced as is Senator Morse - that the President has exceeded
his congressional mandate in the Vietnamese war. Adding
though that he will oppose any effort - to revoke that
mandate.

Such revocation would only serve to deepend division in this country - said Fulbright. Further contending that an overwhelming vote against repeal - would be interpreted as a reaffirmation of waspakiasy U S policy in Southeast Asia. And that would be wrong, too -- said he.

Whatever the opposing war views - the full Senate was, nevertheless, in complete agreement today on a war-related measure. Approving unanimously - a new quarter-billion Dollar G I bill.

The measure now goes to the White House
for President Johnson's signature. Whereupon, an

estimated five million veterans - will become immediately.

GOLDWATER

Elsewhere on Capitol Hill - President Johnson was accused today of playing politics - with recent racial trouble in Detroit. The charge -- from Barry Goldwater; in a brief speech - to Republican Staff members in the House.

Said Goldwater: The President "fiddled while

Detroit burned - he faddled while men died; he finally

turned the whole thing - into a political attack against a

Republican governor." Conclusion - according to

Goldwater, the President must share the blame - for any

future civil violence.

Announcing plans for a massive program of technical, cultural and economic cooperation -- with the French -speaking Canadian Province of Quebec.

Purpose -- said a DeGaulle spokesman - to help Quebec achieve its, quote, "liberation".

This apparently in response to an Ottawa speech yesterday -- by Canadian Prime Minister Lester Pearson, Again rejecting DeGaulle's intrusion - into internal Canadian affairs. Warning that such interference - could only lead to "new frictions" -- as he put it.

Official London - on full-scale alert today.

Prime Minister Harold Wilson and Foreign Secretary

George Brown - rushing back to London for emergency

consultations Britain's new diplomatic crisis with

Red China.

The British Foreign Office emphasizing - it has no desire to break off diplomatic relations with Peking.

Even so - charging the Chinese with a gross violation -
"of normal and civilized rules of behavior." A British spokesman adding "where we go from here - depends entirely on the attitude and behavior of Chinese authorities."

In the meantime, some sixty Chinese diplomats and their families -- are being held as virtual hostage in London, Until the British can determine the fate of some eighty of their own Nationals - still in Peking.
