At Reno, today, things were pretty much as usual. The gambling houses in operation. The Trucker River xxx flowing along. Crowds of people in the department stores -- at the corner of Elk and Sierra Streets.

In one department store -- the owner, W. A. Patterson, noticed a smell of gas. So, he called up the local mi utility company, and told them to hurry over and shut the gas off.

The smell of the gum fumes increased, ordered all customers and employees -- out of the store. They got out -just in time.

The Patterson's store -- the center of a series of explosions that followed. Wrecking the department store building and three others -- a bank building, the Elk's Club, and the Blitz Building. In the crowded department **xxxx** store there would have been a heavy loss of life -- had it not been for the prompt action

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of owner Patterson. In the other three buildings, people were lucky -- because the heavy destruction to / was caused by later explosions. / first blast giving a warning -- and they got out. As it was, only me one life was lost apparently -- although thirty-five people were injured.

The street corner in downtown Reno -looking as though a block-buster bomb had hit it. And fires followed -- the Gray-Reid Department store across the street from Patterson's, caught fire. The blaze raging for five hours. Other buildings -damaged.

The havoc so great that the Nevada National out-Guard was called/with soldiers ~~ taking control of the devastated area. But This -- among a series as of other emergency measures.

At last reports there was fear -- of still further explosions. Impossible to shut off the gas main. Expp Explosive fumes -- continuing to fism pour in. Inhabitants -- evacuated from a wide SUB RENO - 3

area. Reno, toaight- like a city hit by the havoc of war.

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PRINCE

of States.

The Crown Prince of Iraq - today came out in favor of the "Eisenhower Doctrine". When Prince Abdul Illah came from the White House he said that the Eisenhower's plan would be a good thing for the Middle East. "We are happy about it," was the way he put it. Adding that he is sure other Arab leaders will accept the plan - if it is properly explained to them.

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DULLES

Secretary of State Dulles today held his first news conference - in nearly two months. The newsmen of course bombarded him with questions about Middle East **pt** policy, also that cancelled visit by Marshal Tito.

Although he has been under attack in Congress, he said that he is not greatly disturbed by allthe criticism - and, has no intention of resigning. He stibl believes he was right in opposing the Anglo-French attack on Egypt; and that history will agree on this. He admitted though that it was one of the most difficult decisions he ever faced - the decision that we would not back Britain and France - on the invasion of Suez.

He added that he won't mind at allif the Senate **XEXIEN** decides on a complete review of his policies - everything the State Department has done over the past ten years, and, that the Department already is gathering the necessary documents for such review. He said several hundred thousand state papers

are involved - many of which cannot be made public without the consent of other Nations.

Here are some other points he made today: He said we would support the U N - if it voted sanction against Israel - on the Gaza issue. He's not worried about oil for Western Europe - even though it hasn't been flowing as freely as he had hoped because of the reluctance of the Texas Railroad Commission. That enough oil has been getting across the Atlantic - to make unnecessary any further appeal by the President. Finally, he still feels that a visit by Marshal Tito would be useful.

PATIENT

Tonight we know the name of that "mystery patient" in the Moscow hospital. He's the Vice-Chairman of the Soviet Council of Ministers - one, Vyacheslav Malyshev. We still don't know the reason for, the secrecy - that produced the rumor, the sick man was Deputy Premier Kaganovich. When Kaganovich it was assumed was seen in public, the guess see, that the patient must be - someone else in the Arghan cener ocheron of the sovies traderow the turns out to be a encordinete member of the Council of Ministers. o secon Malyshev, an important figure, Pronese the top leader thin.

SOVIET

Today's meeting of the Supreme Soviet in Moscow - was not at all exciting. The rubber-stamp Parliament - putting its okay on a budget presented by Khruschev and company.

Will something more spectacular develop in the next few days? Wa night expect the flow the well bet year khruschev came out with his sensational attack on Stalin. And two years ago, Malenkov stepped out as Premier - after admitting he was a failure.

HUNGARY

Throughout Hungary, the Reds are cracking more down on anti-Communists. Three teachers and seven students from Budapest University - have just been addressing arrested. Mu the Hungarian State Prosecutor, tell a meeting of Prosecutors;- "we have two alternativestough Government or anarchy." The Kadar Government is choosing - tough Government - including the firing squad. STUDENTS

Here's a follow up item on those four British students, who spent several weeks in Hungarian jails. They are back in Britain, where the Red carpet has not been rolled out for them. One, Roger Cooper - has been suspended by St. John's College, Oxford. The staid old British University - taking a dim view of the escapade.

The other three, are being lambasted by the Press. The newspapers saying they had no business getting mixed up in the Hungarian situation.

What shocked the London editors even more "Outrageous" says when asked for their story - they demanded a fee. The London Daily Mail.

In the House of Commons, Laborites are asking how much it cost the British Exchequer - for the negotiations that finally won their release.

CHOU EN LAI

A dispatch from Colombo, Ceylon, tells how the Premier of Communist China today asked: - "Why should we always listen - to the President of the United States?" Chou En Lai, speaking to a news conference bitterly criticising President Eisenhower.

As usual, Chou attacked President Eisenhower for refusing to recognize Red China for refusing to give Mao Tse-Tung a seat in the United Nations. Said Chou: "Let the United States continue not to recognize us but China will not topple down." Then he added that China's present Regime - is good for at least a hundred years.

Again attacking the "Eisenhower Doctrine" for the Middle East, he called it "Imperialism." - America trying to take the place of Britain and France in the Middle East.

Furthermore he said he still believes that the Kashmir problem is not a problem for the United Nations. Entirely up to Pakistan and India.

SHELTER

Navy experts announce a plan for defense against atomic attack. A shelter program, that, would give every American a "ninety-nine per cent" chance of survival. Navy scientist Dr. Paul Tompkins, describing it - before MONTRE DESIG a House Sub-Committee, pointed out that our entire NATLYANTAB country might be contaminated by an atomic raid. That we must be prepared to face bombs equal to one hundred million tons of TNT. An attack that - might leave the country contaminated - from coast to coast - for about five days.

He says we should prepare for this - by setting up adequate shelters - enough to house everybody in the United States. Shelters designed by Navy experts that would be safe against everything - but a direct hit by an atom bomb. That's why he says we would all have a "ninety-nine per cent chance of survival."

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There's one big obstacle - acceptance of the plan by Congress. The cost - thirty-eight billion dollars.

A leader of the National Guard - Strikes back at Pentagon critics - especially at Secretary of Defense Wilson. General E. A. Walsh, President of the National Guard Association - telling newsmen, the National Guard does not need six months basic who is scheduled training. General Walsh, to testify before the House Armed Services Sub-Committee,

gave the press a statement of the positions without waiting to meet the sub-committee. He thinks training like that of the army is unnecessary for the National Guard. He believes the army wastes a lot of time - by including one month for processing and leaves - of - absence -fe put it this way!in its six months program. "If you wring the water out of their six months you'll find you can do it in a lot less." And the That the National Guard is made up of citizen soldiers, If they were ordered to take full army training - that would put them in the same class as the professionals.

INDIANS

The Iroquois of Brantford, Ontario are on the warpath, The Bottekine claiming, thet the mix white man is trying to take the rights from a member of the tribe.

Last June, an Iroquois maid named Minehaha Emoke was married in the traditional manner of the Six Nations. The ceremony, presided over by the Iroquois chief. A year later when her husband was killed in an accident, Squaw Emoke asked the courts to arrange for her to have what she had coming under the terms of her husband's will.

Here entereth the Paleface. The superintendent of Indian Affairs - claims her marriage was not legal; that the Ontario Marriage Act requires - a registered official to perform the ceremony - the Iroquois chief not a registered official, merely a tribal chieftain. So she isn't Squaw Smoke at all, because she washever really married.

The Iroquois are raising a ruction over this. They say that in the first place they are not

subject to the customs and laws of the Dominion of Canada. That under their treaty with the White Man the Iroquois still have their own Sovereign State allied to the Crown. And that the Paleface has trying no right to tell them how an Indian maid should be married.

Ottawa has assigned experts to study the matter. Meanwhile the Iroquois are demanding what they call their treaty rights.
