today from Defense Secretary Melvin/Laird. Telling a House Committee of plans to scale down - USB-52 raids in support of the American war effort in Vietnam. This - said he - in keeping with orders of President Nixon - to cut defense costs.

Next question: does this represent - a U.S. de-escalation of the war? Laird replying, in effect - not necessarily. Further emphasizing that if the war "heated up" again - so would the bombing.
