The United States today let it be knowlit is discussing possible plans for military action against Cuba ... if the Castro government continues to send troops into other countries as it did to Angola. Both the Pentagon and the White House confirmed this. President Ford's Press Secretary, Ron Nessen, was asked about warnings to Cuba by Secretary of State Kissinger. Nessen said, there are a number of things under study. He refused to elaborate. At the Pentagon, press spokesman William Greener said the Joint Chiefs of Staff is taking part in a National Security Council review of possible actions which might be taken with

regard to Cuba. U.S. intelligence sources estimate there are fifteen thousand Cubans in Africa. Many of them were sent to Angola to fight with the victorious Soviet backed faction. Radical black forces in Rhodesia have said they may ask Cuba to send troops to help overthrow the white minority government of Prime Minister Ian Smith.

In London, Soviet Foreign Minister Gromyko today dismissed as fairy tales reports that the Russians may be planning to intervene in Southern Africa. After three days of talks with British leaders, Gromyko said the Soviet Union is often referred to in connection with Rhodesia and Na-MI-bee-ah...but has nothing to do with either of those areas. As for Angola, Gromyko says a deal with the West is in the makings.

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President Ford today formally asked Congress for One Hundred Thirty Five million dollars for production of enough vaccine to innoculate every American against the threat of a dangerous outbreak of swine flu next fall. Senate Democratic leader Mike Mansfield says the request should win easy passage in Congress. The President's action followed intensive study by health experts of a dozen cases saments for his past hermical made again what is believed to be swine influenza - the same flu strain that killed an estimated twenty million people around the world in Nineteen-Eighteen and Nineteen-Nineteen. In Geneval the World Health Organization reacted to the President's moves/with surprise. A month ago it said there was no evidence the disease is spreading. In Oklahoma, a state health official said Mr. Ford might be overreacting but added his moves would be appealing in an election year.

The American Embassy in Moscow was the target of a telephone bomb threat today. Embassy workers stood in sub-freezing temperatures for forty minutes while the building was searched. There was no bomb. The United States filed a protest with the Kremlin, saying it is the belief in Moscow that the bomb threat and other recent incidents are officially sanctioned. It's though the Soviets may be retaliating for recent anti-Soviet acts in the New York area.
