"I do not expact this to lead to civil war."

So said Secretary of State Dean Rusk today - in a major policy statement on the latest political crisis in Viet Nam.

Dean Rusk asserting that we are using "all of our influence" -- to parps we persuade opposing South Vietnamese elements to forget their "lesser' differences, in order to put up a strong front - against the "major xan danger" of Communism.

There "could be civil strife" - he went on.

But our goal remains free elections in the fall - followed by establishment of a constitutionally-based Democratic government.

Meanwhile, U S forces in Viet Nam - today
were plunged directly into the political crisis, by virtue
of an unfortunate incident - at the ancient Imperial capital
of Hue.

An American helicopter - bearing an American

General and loyal Vietnamese General - about to take off

from an attempted meeting with Rebel Army chiefs; when

a wild-eyed Vietnamese Lieutenant - opened fire at the

aircraft. An American machine-gunner - returning the fire,

kthi killing the Lieutenant - but inadvertently wounding

six other Vietnamese \*\*\*\* standing by.

Buddhist reaction - swift and angry. About a hundred Buddhist students - attempting to prevent the helicopter from taking off. When that failed - Buddhist leaders quickly accusing the United States - of complicity with Premier Ky.

The Senate Foreign Relations Committee -- went formally on record today -- demanding a right to share in Senate supervision -- of the Central Intelligence Agency. This by placing three members of the Foreign Relations Committee -- on the present Senate Committee overseeing the CIA.

Touring Soviet Premier Kosgyin -- at it again today in Cairo. RippingU.S. policy in the Middle East -- in a half-hour speech to the Egyptian National Assembly.

At the same time -- in Moscow, Soviet Party boss Brezhnev -- calling the U.S. a "dangerous beast of prey" in Viet Nam.

And promising continued support of the Communist Viet Cong -- by "concrete deeds", as well as "machinery, equipment, and excellent arms" -- as he put it.

A story of murder - with possible political repercussions - comes today from Beirut. The victim - Kamel Mrowa - publisher of the Arabic Daily Al Hayat and the Beirut Daily Star; the latter - one of the leading English-language newspapers - in the entire Middle East.

Mrowa is said to have been shot and kkkh killed - while at work in his office. The alleged gunman - a

Lebanese identified only as Adnan Shaker - who was quickly captured by police. But why he killed the publisher - still a mystery.

Sudden death - followed by sudden retribution - today; near the tiny community of Burnt Cabins - in the rugged wilderness of South Central Pennsylvania.

A man sniper - who had kidnapped a school
girl six days ago shooting - and killing an F B I man
who was hot on his trail. Only to be trapped himself
on a nearby mountain peak - by a horde of avenging

puxu pursuers. Authorities finally calling up six army
half-tracks - to storm the mountain refuge. The outcome still in doubt - at last report.

A warning to all ships and planes - to stay

clear of France's Pacific nuclear testing ground - made

public today in Paris. The warning establishing two

"forbidden areas" - surrounding Maruroa atoll; the French

nuclear test base - about eight hundred miles southeast

of Tahiti.

A French Naval task force - currently enroute to the area - with actual tests - said to be set for some time early in July. The French expected to detonate - a number of medium-range atomic weapons. Their first H-bomb -- still a long way off.

While back in Metropolitan France -- a massive general strike was on today -- with some Seven Million workers in state-run industries involved. The twenty-four hour walkout crippling bus and subway service in Paris -- cutting off electricty and gas throughout the nation -- paralyzing the railroads, radio and television -- and forcing the closing of banks, offices, department stores and restaurants.

Thousands of marchers shouting -- "down with Charlie."

The strike -- in short -- the biggest labor tie-up since DeGaulle took office. Their protest is against government wage policies. Police today reporting great difficulty handling traffic jams. Warren -- streams of cars with tens of thousands heading for an extra day's vacation in the sunny countryside.

A perfect lift-off -- followed by failure today at Cape Kennedy -- as you have doubtless heard by now. An unmanned Atlas-Agena rocket -- intended to serve as a space target for the Gemini-Nine -- fizzling out short of orbit; and plunging -- back into the sea. Forcing postponement of the entire mission -- for about three weeks.

For Command Pilot Tom Stafford -- waiting with Astronaut Gene Cernan in the Gemini-Nine -- it was the second such cancellation, his only reported comment: "Aw shucks."
