Following the funeral service, Welch was buried at Arlington National Cemetery.

The civil war in Angola got an airing at the White House today - President Ford and Secretary Kissinger discussing it. There are reports of some movement but no breakthrough in the President's effort to get the Russians out and thwart a possible confrontation between Washington and Moscow.
