At the United Nations - the Indian Ocean island of Mauritius today withdrew a motion it made last night, a motion to defer the consideration of global terrorism - at least till next year. Whereupon the General Assembly's steering committee - brushing aside Arab, Chinese and African opposition; voted to place the issue of terrorism - squarely on this year's agenda.

In Vietnam- government troops were striking out today - from newly recaptured Quang Tri City; in the process - driving across the nearby Thack Han River; attempting to knock out enemy gun positions which have been shelling Quang Tri virtually non-stop for weeks. This marking the deepest the government forces have yet penetrated into occupied territory in the far north.
