Good evening. John Mitchell resigned today - as

U.S. Attorney General; to become instead President Nixon's

election campaign manager - the same job he held in 'Sixty
Eight. Mitchell saying: "It is with considerable regret
that I leave the President's Cabinet; but I do so with the

firm belief - that I will be working to attain the greatest

good for the country."

As for Mitchell's successor - the nominee is

Richard Kleindienst, his former chief assistant. The

latter - you may recall - a key aide to Barry Goldwater

back in 'Sixty-Four.

On Capitol Hill - the Pentagon's annual "posture" report to Congress. Defense Secretary Melvin Laird - said that Russia is close to achieving a "major new military capability;" perhaps - said he - roughly comparable to the Sputnik - which stunned the space world more than decade ago.

For that reason and others - Laird urged a long-range modernization of U.S. defenses. Estimated cost - more than Eighty-Three Billion.

He also said the U.S. is still shooting for an all-volunteer Army - as of mid-'Seventy-Three; but barring an increase in enlistment rates - well, there's still the draft.

The Vietnam talks at Paris - again in a state of suspended animation. The U.S. and South Vietnam today canceled out temporarily - because of, "the other side's recent propaganda activities." Which means, apparently, no talks - while the President is visiting Red China.

After weeks of seemingly endless confusion - the Howard Hughes-Clifford Irving case apparently began to sort itself out today. At any rate, a Federal judge here in New York - ordered the arrest of Clifford's wife, Edith; who is wanted in Switzerland - on charges of counterfeiting, forgery, embezzlement and theft. Mrs. Irving later agreed to surrender tomorrow morning - when a date will be set for an extradition hearing.

At the same time, a Federal grand jury - heard from two of Irving's "other women;" singer Nina Van Pallandt - and scuba diver Anne Baxter; after which they told it all over again - before a New York County grand jury. Observers noted that one or more indictments - may be imminent.

At the end of un overnight visit to the new state
of Bangladesh - a brief departure statement today from
Senator Kennedy of Massachusetts. At Dacca Airport,
the Senator told a cheering crowd - he will return home
and "insist" that the U.S. government officially recognize
Bangladesh. Kennedy added that the American public already favors such a move.

From the jungles of India's Eastern Bihar State comes the story of another elephant stampede; the third
there - in less than two weeks. A herd of giant
pachyderms - stormed through a small village; in the
process, trampling to death two persons - also, destroying
crops and homes; when they were finally done - leaving the
