GOOD EVENING EVERYBODY:

The first head of Castro's revolutionary government repeats that Cuba has become - Communist headquarters in the western hemisphere. Jose Cardona, out of Havana on a safe conduct, made the statement at Balboa, in the Canal Zone. He added that he's sure Castro will fall - because of the economic crisis inside Cuba; the crisis that is causing more and more unrest among the Cuban people.

When will Castro fall? His former associate - declines to guess on this.

KHRUSHCHEV

Around the U N some delegates are talking about "Khrushchev's frustration speech," that's what they call the one he made today - when he struck at both the U N and the United States, bearing down on colonialism and segregation.

Khrushchev went into his old routine - on the Congo, attacking Dag Hammarskjold - and Colonel Mobutu, and calling on all colonial peoples - to overthrow the colonial powers by force, promising them - Russian aid.

Again playing to the new African nations - Khrushchev mentioned segregation in the United States. He charged that this is the typical American attitude. And so on and so on.

So they call it Khrushchev's "frustration speech." The Red Dictator is said to be savage - because of his diplomatic defeats in the U N and because defector Viktor Jaanimets of the Baltika - has now been granted political asylum in the United States.

CONGO

As for the situation in the Congo seems to have reached - an impasse. The U N still refuses to surrender Lumumba - on the grounds that would be meddling in the internal affairs of the Congo. Strong man Mobutu still demands that Lumumba be turned over to him - and charges that the U N refusal constitutes interference in an internal Congolese affair.

Tonight Lumumba is in his home - with a U N guard. Mobutu now has thrown a cordon of troops - around the whole area.

JAPAN

That riot in Japan was touched off by - the
assassination of a Socialist leader. Injiro Asanuma, *while*
addressing a political rally - was stabbed by a rightist.
News of the crime brought the fanatical Zengakuren - out
into the streets of Tokyo. Fifteen thousand of them snake
danced through the center of the city -- and clashed repeatedly
with the police. Result - about a hundred injured.

TRUMAN

A leading American Baptist refuses to apologize -
to the Baptists. Former President Truman, declaring - I
never back down on anything I say.

The rumpus began when H.S.T. asserted in one of
his political speeches - "if you vote for Nixon, you ought
to go to blazes." Seventy-two pastors of his church, ^{who have} ~~which~~
~~has~~ endorsed Nixon - don't like that kind of language, ^{or -}
that kind of advice. ^{and} They're demanding - an apology. To
which Baptist Harry Truman retorts - "the Baptists aren't
going to tell me how to vote."

DEBATE

The third Nixon-Kennedy debate - is scheduled for tomorrow night. And, as we know, there ^{has} been a lot of speculation - about who won the first two. Tonight we have the opinions - of some real experts. The question was put up to a conference of debate coaches in Columbus, Ohio. The teachers of oratory - who guide debating teams in high schools and colleges.

Here's how they see the personal clash - between the two candidates. Twenty one debate coaches believe - Kennedy won the first round. Three coaches - for Nixon. One saying - neither won.

The second debate? It shows that sixteen coaches feel - that Nixon won. Eleven - for Kennedy. Three - don't know.

In other words, ^{they say} / Kennedy clearly won the first **one** ~~debate~~. Nixon clearly won - the second ^{one} ~~in/ debate~~. The series thus far - a draw, according to the experts in elocution.

Or have they really been debates?

BOMB

The New York police are afraid they may have another "mad bomber" on their hands. Today, the third explosion - within ten days. ^a ~~the~~ ^{that} blast shattered part of a subway station - and injured ^{some} ~~almost~~ thirty passengers in a holiday crowd celebrating Columbus Day.

ROYALTY

The King of Denmark called at the White House today - for an hour's conference with President Eisenhower. King Frederick ~~the~~ ^{the} ninth emerged to tell newsmen - it was just a courtesy call. But His Majesty admitted that the house was spent - on more than pleasantries. The King and the President discuss^{ed}~~ing~~ major world problems, with emphasis on Nato - and the common defense of the west.

While the White House conversation was going on, the Queen of Denmark was at a children's hospital in Washington - cheering the inmates and inspecting our methods of handling youngsters, when they need medical attention.
