The White House announces that President Nixon is planning to meet tomorrow with his new energy emergency action group. This raising again the spectre of possible gas rationing.

White House Press Secretary Ron Ziegler however, says there is "nothing specific on the agenda." With the President still holding the view that "although we have to have contingency plans - gas rationing is something not contemplated at this time.

In a legs lengthy exchange with newsmen Rom Ziegler also discussed "so-called blank spots" on the President's Watergate tapes; expressing confidence that the experts will find - they were caused by extraneous noises that somehow activated the taping system. "There was no tampering with the tapes" - said he. "The experts will find no tampering exists."

In the same vein - Ziegler saying "there is a very serious question - about the staff of the special prosecutor's office in political terms."

"They are attempting to work fairly" - he continued.

From the Federal Power Commission a directive today addressed to more than a thousand major electrical utilities. Seventy-Four." "And the rate of employment" he

continued - "would not exceed six percent at any time."
