

PALESTINE L.T. Deleo. Mon. Oct. 15-56.

The Premier of Israel gave a warning, today. David Ben Gurion saying- that, if troops from Iraq march into Jordan Israel <sup>will</sup> ~~would~~ have - cause for action.

The British are in favor of sending Iraqi soldiers into the Jordanian Kingdom. Arguing - that it would "stabilize that area." Jordan, right now - disturbed, politically unstable. So, in the capital city of Amman, King Hussein and his cabinet have been conferring on a proposal - to bring in well disciplined troops to Iraq, to hold the lid on.

The Israelis, however, take the view - that Iraq remains, technically, at war with them. When an armistice was concluded in Nineteen Forty-Eight, it was duly signed - by other Arab states. But not - by Iraq. Which, says Israel, didn't matter much - since Iraq does not adjoin Israel.

<sup>by across!</sup> <sup>the Arabian Peninsula.</sup> Iraq, on the other side <sup>of Jordan</sup> <sup>^</sup> But it would be another matter - if the Army of Iraq were to move into Jordan, <sup>right up to</sup> ~~on~~ <sup>^</sup> the border of Israel; - soldiers of a country, technically, ~~at~~ at war with Israel.

That's the background for Premier Ben Gurion's  
declaration today - that Israel would have "cause for action."

FOLLOW PALESTINE

Tonight's news - is that ~~Jordan~~ Jordan and Iraq have concluded a formal ~~agreement~~ agreement. Providing that ~~Iraqi~~ Iraqi troops will come to the aid of Jordan if Israel should attack. No mention , however, of <sup>soldiers</sup> ~~soldiers~~ of Iraq marching into Jordan - except as defense against an Israeli assault.

At the United Nations, tonight, Jordan put the Palestine question before the Security council. Demanding that Israel be condemned for the raid across the Jordan border last week.

## SUEZ

President Eisenhower says: "Things look better again, today." Speaking - with reference to the Suez Canal crisis - which has been going through gyrations.

First, the optimism caused by the six point agreement between Britain and France, and Egypt. Then - the permission, when Soviet Russia vetoed a western power motion at the U N. Calling - for a support of internationalization. Now, U N Secretary Hammarskjold agrees - he'll undertake another task at mediation.

Today's presidential opinion was given, not at a news conference, but at a picture-taking session. One of the press photographers - asking him about Suez. The President replying: It looked a little bad last night on the Suez thing. But things look better again today."



EISENHOWER YUGOSLAVIA

President Eisenhower announces a decision - ~~an~~  
th<sup>t</sup> question of American aid for Yugoslavia. Should we continue  
to help Communist Marshal Tito - in spite of his new friendly  
relations with Moscow? The President says - yes, with  
qualifications.

We will continue to deliver economic aid - and some  
military aid, but not <sup>the</sup> two hundred American jet planes and  
other ~~xxx~~ heavy military equipment - previously scheduled to  
go to Yugoslavia. That material will be held up, says the  
President - until we can form some clearer judgment of relations  
between Marshal Tito and Moscow. <sup>only</sup> Military materials of a  
minor character - will be delivered.

## ITALY

The Italian Communist Party announces - a drastic change of policy. The adoption of "Democratic methods". New tactics - of lining up with non-Communist parties. Renouncing, what are called - "errors". The errors of Stalinism, that is.

The big change - announced in Communist newspapers, today. The new "platform" - to be placed before a convention of Italian Communists in December.

HOLLAND

The Dutch government issues an angry denial - that its leaders are plotting to dethrone Queen Juliana. Yesterday, the London Sunday ~~pic~~ pictorial printed reports - that there were plans to put eighteen year old Princess Beatrix on the throne.

The official denial says that Queen Juliana has broken acquaintance with Greet Hofmans, the sixty year ~~old~~ old faith healer - who caused the "palace crisis" to begin with. Juliana - not having seen the faith healer since August. And adds - that the Queen is trying to reorganize the royal staff at the Palace.

Which would seem to refer to followers of the Faith healer - who ~~are~~ remain members of the Queen's entourage. The charge being that these proteges of Greet Hofmans have been dabbling in politics - international politics. <sup>Even</sup> Urging Juliana - to take the Netherlands out of the North Atlantic Pact. And adopt - an "attitude of neutralism" between East and West.

## TOWNSEND

At the Air Ministry in London, today, an officer walked in - and went through the formality of resigning from the R A F. Group Captain Peter Townsend - ending a career that had begun so brilliantly.

In the Second World War - a fighter pilot, an ace, who shot down eleven Nazi planes. After the war, - attached<sup>a</sup> to the Royal Staff at Buckingham Palace. And it seemed - as if he might rise high in the R A F.

But that headline romance intervened - between Townsend and Princess Margaret. ~~That~~ Their marriage ~~is~~ barred by the fact that he was ~~divorce~~ divorced. And he was ~~is~~ transferred, sent over to the British Embassy in Brussels, as air attache. Which was regarded - as a species of exile. His career in the Royal Air Force - now leading nowhere.

Retiring from the R A F, today, Group Captain Townsend will go off on a tour of the world by automobile. Driving - a "land rover", a British car something like a jeep. Making a tour - of the Middle East, the Far East.



JAPANESE

Here's the kind of story <sup>that was</sup> a nine day wonder =  
a few years ago. <sup>And now its'</sup> almost unbelievable - that it should crop up  
again.

Over in the Philippines, arrangements made - for  
a Philippine military officer and a Japanese diplomat to go into  
the jungles of the island of Mindoro. To negotiate - with  
fifty Japanese soldiers, left over from World War Two.

Nearly a dozen years ago, when MacArthur reconquered  
the Philippines, those Japanese - took to the hills. Lurking,  
ever since - in <sup>a tropical</sup> ~~the~~ vast wilderness. ~~of tropical thickets.~~ Raiding  
farms on the edge of the jungle - for food supplies.

Recently, the mayor of the town of Roxas was able  
to talk to leaders of the Japanese fugitives, convincing them ~~to~~  
that the war was over. They said they'd surrender, if they  
could be sure - they'd be sent back to Japan.

So now, Colonel Juan Relosa of the Philippine  
islands and Toyukichi Nakagawa, secretary of the Japanese

Embassy in Tokyo - will go ~~to~~ to the jungles of Mindoro. To arrange a belated surrender of soldiers of the Mikado. Eleven years - after the end of the war.

## PLANE

A British tanker, today, discovered debris -  
an empty liferaft and two airplane wheels. Which the R A F  
identifies - as having belonged to the American military  
transport plane, missing at sea. With - fifty-nine aboard.

The wreckage found floating - three-hundred-and-  
seventy miles off the British coast. So that's where a sea-  
air search now converges. In the hope - that survivors in  
boats may be found.

## ATOM SHIP

Full speed ahead - in the construction of an atom powered merchant fleet. President Eisenhower, today, holding a White House meeting with top atomic and merchant marine officials. Giving them - a final go ahead. The construction of an atom powered merchant fleet - ~~EXPENSED~~ expected to begin next year.

And, today, President Eisenhower pressed a golden telegrapher's key - that touched off blasts in both Utah and Arizona. Beginning - the one billion dollar upper Colorado water storage project.



SUPREME COURT TURKS

In the decisions handed down by the Supreme Court today, <sup>there</sup> was one concerning the "Turks" of South Carolina. A group of dark skinned people, who say they <sup>are</sup> descendants of Turkish ancestors, telling- how their forefathers came to the United States shortly after the revolutionary war. Their children - attending a special school provided for them, under South Carolina segregation.

Recently, the Turks asked admission for their children - in white schools. The Supreme Court - now refusing to hear their appeal, on the ground - that they have not yet exhausted the possibilities of the State law in South Carolina.

## JUNKETS

The facts are out - about members of Congress, their staffs and families, making trips to the Caribbean. Hitherto, the Panama Canal Steamship Company, owned by the Federal Government, had been keeping the data ~~in~~ secret. But there's a public demand, and President Eisenhower said - he thought those Congressional junkets should be made public.

So now the steamship company reveals that - in the last fifteen months, three Senators and Sixteen Congressmen have traveled on its luxury liners - free. Also - six employees of Congressional committees. The travelers were accompanied by a total of thirty-five dependents. These - ~~required~~ required to pay only twenty-five percent of the regular fare.

The junketeers <sup>- both</sup> ~~are~~ Republicans and Democrats. Most of them ~~were~~ members of the House Merchant Marine and Fisheries committee - ~~in~~ which has jurisdiction over legislation connected with the Panama Canal.

STEVENSON

Adlai Stevenson, today, went from his Illinois farm - to the nearby town of Libertyville. Where he drove to the home of William G. Wells, a seventy-four year old retired baby shoe salesman. He knocked at the door, ~~xxx~~ and said to brother Wells: "I'm a Democrat looking for dollars for Democrats." Am I at the right place?"

He was. Mr. Wells laughed, and handed over- five dollars. Then Adlai asked: "How are the Democrats doing around here?"

To which Wells replied that the county is rock-ribbed Republican. Remarking - that, sometimes he feels, he's the only Democrat in that area.

Candidate Stevenson was undaunted by this, and said: "We're covering every neighborhood in the country." Adding - that, beginning tomorrow, half a million Democrats will be asking for small donations in their neighborhoods.

Raising funds - to keep the Presidential campaign on radio and T.V.

Tonight, the Democratic nominee makes a nationally televised address - explaining why he thinks this country should stop hydrogen bomb tests. The speech - opening a final phase of the Democratic presidential campaign.



ADD STEVENSON

Speaking in Chicago, tonight, Stevenson promised that if elected, he would make a personal attempt to negotiate with Soviet Russia and Great Britain. Seeking - an agreement to halt H-bombs tests.

EISENHOWER

President Eisenhower - off on a five day campaign swing. Taking him - to the middlewest, California, the northwest. ~~MAN~~ Having celebrated his sixty-sixth birthday yesterday, the President begins an intensive personal bid for votes.

Tonight, in a recorded T.V. appearance, he launches a new series of five minute television spots. Quickening the pace - of the G O P campaign.

POLITICS KENNEDY

Senator John Kennedy of Massachusetts made an election prediction today. Forecasting - that the Democrats will win Congress. But - not the White House.

The Democratic Senator from Massachusetts gave an opinion - that President Eisenhower is leading Adlai Stevenson. That Stevenson will have to make "greater strides". In the next three weeks- if he hopes to win.

Kennedy describes the contest in these words:

"A race between a party and a man. Between the solid strength of the Democratic party and the immense personal popularity of President Eisenhower."

## ROBBERY

At Columbus, Ohio a surprising scene - in a book store. Strewn along the floor - furs, mink, sable, chinchilla. A trail of exceedingly valuable furs - among shelves of books. Leading - to a hole in the wall.

Columbus, Ohio - reporting -- a four hundred thousand dollar robbery - the biggest in the history of the city. Thieves looting - a fashionable fur shop.
