Kleindienst also cited the experience of four states Georgia, Kentucky, Hawaii and Alaska - which have
already lowered their voting ages. Observing that "none
of these states - has any regrets about its policy;" nor
have any advocated a return to the old standard - said he.

UNITED NATIONS

At the United Nations - U Thant today held his first press conference of Nineteen-Seventy. Chief topic - the Middle East. The U.N. Secretary General asserting that "only some very strong measures - can avert a new catastrophe" there.

U Thant then went on to say - that he himself would not take the initiative in heading off this threatened "catastrophe." He said he would leave it instead to the Big Four powers - or the full fifteen-member Security anything.

Meanwhile, Israeli warplanes today were attacking Egyptian targets - less than twenty miles from Cairo.
