INDO-CHINA follow HANOI. Just what is wrong in Indo-China? Part of the answer comes from Frank Bartholomew, Vice President of the United Press.

He flew over the battle lines - and then filed the story about what he saw.

Bartholomew notes that the French still have some advantages. They control the skies - which was min why his plane was able to fly around at leisure. The Reds, not even throwing up any anti-aircraft shells. The French Air Force, able to attack as it pleases.

American military observers told him that the French Union forces out-number the enemy - and have superiority in fire power of at least two to one. And tons of supplies are arriving all the time.

So what's wrong? Here's the way Bartholomew answers that question: "The French have a well-equipped and deployed defense force, superior to the enemy in

everything -- except the will to win. The correspondent notes that the Vietnam troops are becoming less reliable because they want to be on the winning side. Senator Flanders announces that he will FLANDERS. continue his attack on Senator McCarthy; next Tuesday. The Vermont Republican, saying he'll ask the Senate to take his resolution away from the Rules Committee. The plane got up into the air all right. It seemed to be flying perfectly through a clear sky. Then suddenly plunged to earth - crashing into the Cranfield Airport.

Observers say the plan gave a "dying shrick"
as it came down. It just missed a bus before it
struck the earth, and blew up. Said one witness: "The
aircraft plunged into the airfield like a stone."

All four of the crew were killed - in the crash of the "foolproof plane."

Charlotte Trego, of Denver, Colorado, was riding on a train in West Berlin. But she went past her stop, and ended up in East Berlin. She asked the Police how to get back - but instead of showing her the way, they arrested her and she was taken to Soviet headquarters.

INDIANS. How much would you say the State of California is worth? The Indians are putting it - at about ninety-three million dollars. That's what they want Uncle Sam to pay them; as "honest compensation" and "conscience money". If they get it, it will mean about three thousand dollars per Indian.

Their claim is being supported by professors at the University of California; Anthropologists, Albert Kroeber and Samuel Barrett, and Physiologist, S.F. Cook.
