WHITE HOUSE

The plight of America's poor - topic A today at the White House. With President Nixon pledging priorit attention - to "the blight on poverty" - as he put it. The job to include a complete overhaul of the so-called "war on poverty" as it has existed up to now. First step in the President's new battle plan - as relayed to Congress a request for continuation of the Experimental Office of Economic Opportunity - the government's chief antipoverty agency - for at least another year: but with four of its main programs - including Head Start and the Job Corps - transferred to regular government agencies. The President further promising "a comprehensive proposal" by July first - covering the future of the entire poverty program. With special emphasis on righting powerty programs that seem to have gone sour. Poverty "cannot and will not be treated lightly" by this Administration - said the President. Adding:

"The public generally and the poor especially - have
the right to demand effective and efficient
management" in this area - "and I intend to provide it."

Underscoring the President's remarks —

Congressional testimony today by one of the nation's

leading nutritionists. Dr. James Carter of Vanderbilt

University - asserting that hunger is widespread
"particularly among children" in many parts of South

Carolina. Indeed, so prevalent is the problem - said

he - that these areas - if located overseas - could

easily qualify for U.S. Foreign Aid.

KENNEDY FOLLOW CAPITOL HILL

You have heard about the threat of spiraling inflation - Treasury Secretary David Kennedy today was telling a joint Senate-House economic committee - there is little hope for an early end to the present ten percent income tax surcharge. Nor is there much hope for an early end to record high interest rates - said he.

Adding: "The economy must be placed under firm restraint - until there are unmistakable signs that we are headed back on a non-inflationary path."

On the peace front Paris - the end of the line today for U S Deputy Peace Negotiator, Cyrus Vance: who returns home to rejoin his law firm - after playing a most important role in bringing about the expanded talks.

Vance's last official act - a "farewell call" on the North Vietnamese delegation: after which he predicted that "eventually - a settlement will come out of the Paris meetings.

Meanwhile - in Vietnam the war goes on.

Ground action today - including a fierce battle for control of the vital A Shau Valley. With allied troops coming out on top - pushing the enemy back across the Laotian border.

As they fled the scene - the Communists

leaving behind nearly two hundred bodies. A later check

of the battlefield - also uncovered a mass grave for

about a hundred and eighty more - killed earlier.

Overseas - the Middle East is still the focus of world attention tonight. With Arabs, Israelis, UN observers and neutrals alike - in effect "waiting for the other shoe to drop." Waiting for a possible Israeli reprisal raid - considered almost certain to come - in the wake of that Arab attack yesterday - on an El Al Airliner at Zurich.

When last we heard - nothing, as yet. However,

Jerusalem warning today - it will not tolerate Arab

guerrilla attacks on civilian jets. With rumors later

suggesting Syria's Damascus airport - as number one

on Israel's most wanted list.

NEW ORLEANS

New Orleans - another surprising turn of
events today - in the Clay Shaw conspiracy trial. With
the District Attorney Jim Garrison - cancelling
schedulea testimony by former Texas Governor John
Connelly. He had expected Governor Connelly to
bolster his conspiracy theory - Garrison saying he
now considers the former Governor "a hostile witness."

What's in a name? Often - a lot. As witness a number of items - making news today.

For example - a report from troubled West

Berlin; noting that the people of that city call the

infamous Berlin Wall - der schandmauer. In English
"the wall of shame."

Another item from Texas; telling of a population explosion - among the amadillo, causing extensive damage to crops, poultry farms, and wildlife, too. With the burgeoning armidillo practically impervious to his enemies - as his name would indicate. Dating back to the Spanish conquistadores - they called him - quote - "the little fella in armor."

Next - a story from Australia; reporting
the widespread slaughter of kangaroos - threatening
the species with extinction. Why they permit - it I'll
never know. Which is just about what the aborigine

said - when Captain Cook first asked him the name of that strange looking animal. "Kangaroo"! said the aborigine. Which means - literally - "I don't know."

What do you know, Warren? Kangaroo,
I mean.

From Moscow comes news - of a long awaited

Soviet film first. The premier performance - of Russia's

classic "Andrei Rublev" drawing crowds so large - police

were finally called to control those who couldn't get in.

The reason, in part, because "Andrei Rublev" - is the Soviet Union's first frankly religious film. Telling the life story of a fourteenth century monk who became the country's greatest painter of religious ikons - an inspiration to millions. Another reason the fact that it's the first Soviet film - to depict the cruelty, violence and wide-spread debauchery of feudal Russia; including scenes that portray the crucifixion of peasants - as well as mass orgies - by naked revelers. So real - we are told - that the film was held up two years by Kremlin censors.

"Andrei Rublev" proving, in short - a combination of early Cecil B. DeMille - and modern Greenwich Village. As such - a box office smash.
