Jordan's tough, young King Hussein - principal speaker today at the United Nations in New York. Flying in from his capital at Amman - to represent personally the Arab cause in the present mid-east crisis. In his own words - to "state clearly our position - and request that the issue be solved promptly and with justice."

If such is the case- said Hussein - there can be but one outcome - immediate condemnation - of what he called "Israeli aggression" plus a demand that the Israelis "give up at once - the territory they have occupied."

King Hussein also expressing "astonishment" at earlier failure of the Security Council to act accordingly. Said he: "I could very well imagine the Hue and cry that would have been raised - if the Arabs had attacked and we were today in Tel Aviv."

That none has occurred in the present situation - said he - clearly indicative of a "double standard on the

part of some pow rs, in considering the rights of Arabs - and the rights of Israelis."

Hussein concluding finally - that the United

Nations simply cannot permit Israel to keep any of the

territory it seized for by force: for if it does - said he
U N ceasefire orders will never gain be obeyed - in any

part of the world.

CHARGE FOLLOW UNITED NATIONS

Earlier, a public blast from Foreign Minister

Nest Nase - of Communist Albania. Accusing President

Johnson and Soviet Premier Kosygin of collusion - at

their weekend Glassooro summit conference.

This - said Nase - an attempt on the part of the United States and Russia - to betray the Arab countries; also to plot world domination - said he; adding lustily -- "down with the Johnson-Kosygin plot!"

KOSYGIN

As for Kosygin himself - a brief news conference today at New York's Kennedy airport - and then he was gone. Flying to Havana for post-summit talks with Cuban Premier Fidel Castro - on his way back to Moscow.

Kosygin's last words on U S soil: 26 the effect that his visit to the United States had only one aim - "the alleviation of world tensions." However, the Soviet Premier making it plain - he's still standing firm on his headline policies; with regard to the Mid-East and Vietnam.

WHITE HOUSE

In the meantime - President Johnson carried the momentum of those Glassboro talks - one step more today. Meeting at the White House with Communist Premier Ion Maurer of Romania - who has become twee increasingly independent of Moscow of late.

The President also summoning congressional leaders - to a special White House briefing; to discuss results and conclusions - of his ten hours of talks with Kosygin.

MANSFIELD

What does it all mean? Perhaps the best
summation - from Senate majority leader Mike Mansfield.
Who said today there was "no open conciliation of
differences" between President Johnson and Soviet
Premier Kosygin; but there was - as he put it -- "a
better understanding of the position of both countries."

In short - said Mansfield - a case of "no runs - no hits - no errors."

PANAMA

Turning to our own hemisphere - a joint announcement today from the United States and Panama.

Disclosing tentative agreement on a Series of new treaties - covering the Panama Canal; also - a possible new sea level Canal.

The treaties - three in all. However, no indication as yet - what they provide. Details apparently withheld -- pass pending ratification by both governments.

A related item - from the Vatican in Rome.

Where Pope Paul today proclaimed twenty-seven new

Cardinals - including four Americans.

The Pontiff taking advantage of the occasion to call for guaranteed international status for the city
of Jerusalem. Noting the city is sacred - to christians,
Moslems and Jews alike. Adding that it "must remain for
all" time - "the city of God - a free oasis of peace and
prayer."

News from Saigon tells today of record em enemy losses - in the northern Provinces of South Vietnam. An estimated two thousand men - in the past two months; ever since U S army troops were rushed into the region - to bolster marine forces already there. American losses for the same period - called Matrice "light."

South Vietnamese and South Korean forces - also holding their own of late. As evidenced by battle reports today from an allied coastal sweep 4 near the ancient imperial capital of Hue. South Vietnamese paratroopers - wiping out more than a hundred of the Viet Cong in one engagement; the South Koreans - in a second fight - adding some forty more to the toll.

On the political front - a mild frontal assault today by South Vietnamese chief of State Thieu; who is running against Premier Ky - for President. Thieu charging that his speeches and interviews - were being censored by Ky appointees. Not cricket -said he.

From neighboring Thailand - the story today of a breve school teacher in a remote jungle village. Thit Sungkrit - by name; who refused to submit to a raid - by some seventy Communist guerrillas. Wresting a machine gun from one of the raiders - and standing off the rest single-handed for some two-and-a-half hours.

By the time help arrived - the school teacher was badly wounded. However, three guerrillas also paying with their lives - and their mission ending in total failure.

As a result of which -- Thai Prime Minister Thanom

Kittikachorn sent special congratulations today, to the provincial hospital - where Thit Sunghrit is now recovering from his wearded x wounds.

The school teacher's courage - an example for all the people - said the Prime Minister. For it shows - he went on - that it is possible to defy the guerrillas - and win.

PENTAGON

Here at home - an announcement today from the Pentagon. Telling of a U S phantom jet -- shot down by Red Chinese fighters; when it strayed into Communist air space -- over Hainan Island.

Luckily though - the two flyers aboard were rescued from the South China Sea. The Pentagon further explaining that the plane was bound from Manila - to Da Nang in South Vietnam; when it "apparently experienced a failure -- of its manifestational and communications gear."

MIDDLETOWN

The folly of drag-racing on a public highway - amply demonstrated in a story that comes today from Middletown, Ohio. Telling of a race that ended abruptly - with both cars smashing into a bridge abutment at ninety miles an hour.

The crash film hilling both drivers - as well as a passenger in one of the cars; the one that hit the abutment head-on - smashing into a million pieces.

Sheriff's deputies later reporting - "it took two loads of a pickup truck to carry" that car away. A pick-up used for the job - they explained - because of all the wreckage - "the biggest piece an inch," sait the Shuiff.

PHILIPPINES

From the land of Kalinga warriors in the

Philippines - news today of a truce at last; between the

warring tribes of Pinukpuk - and Balbalan!

The new peace treaty - negotiated by government officials from Manila. Formally ratified - by a week of feasting among tribal leaders. Ending years of bloody fighting - with spears and bolo knives.

Terms of the agreement- as follows: Henceforth, if a member of one tribe hills a member of the other tribe - he must pay the victim's family twelve water buffaloes.

He is also honor-bound to pick up the tab for an elaborate ritual funeral - and later to present himself to a government court for trial."

For a lesser offense - such as "dallying" with a woman of an opposing tribe - the offender will be fined one water buffalo - if the woman happens to be married.
