WHITE HOUSE

President Ford met today with Congressional leaders - in another attempt to reach a compromise on oil price controls; but apparently - to no avail. White House Press Secretary Ron Nessen later saying: Tomorrow "the President is going to veto"the bill to extend present price controls for six months. Adding that the President "is confident when the vote in the Senate rolls around - there will be enough votes to sustain."

Nessen went on to indicate, however that there still may be a meeting of minds on this. Saying: "If the President gets a reasonable assurance Congress will approve phased decontrol of oil prices - he will support a forty-five day extention." TRIPOLI

In the Middle East - at Tripoli, Lebanon - a second day of fighting between left wing Moslems and right wing Christians. Police saying more than thirty have already died - and the figure is sure to go much higher if the fighting doesn't end soon. LICE

The death toll from the weekend earthquake Leeguk near Lice, Turkey - now set at an estimated twenty-four hundred. men, women and children. More than twelve hundred in Lice alone - and the figure could go even higher. A rescue worker saying today practically "every time our picks hit the ground - we find another deed body."

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WASHINGTON

Washington again - the Republican National Committee today unanimously picked Kansas City, Missouri - as the site of next year's Republican National Convention. A spokesman conceding that Kansas City is short on convention floor space - and some twenty-five hundred visitors will have to stay at Topeka, Kansas Aixty miles away. But he stressed: "There never was such a genuine display of hospitality and enthusiasm" - as was shown by Kansas City. Adding: "There will be some inconveniences but unhappiness, we think not." POSTAL

From Postmaster General Benjamin Bailar - a request today for double the subsidy now being paid by the Q.S. government - to support the Postal Service. The new figure, if approved by Congress - thus to come to nearly Two Billion-a-year; badly needed - said Bailar - "lest the price of postage rise beyond the reach of some Americans - and impede the free flow of ideas and information." BOGOTA

At Bogota, Colombia - the Inspector-General of the Colombian Army, General Ramon Rincon Quinones was ambushed and shot to death today. Police saying his assailants were members of the so-called National Liberation Army - an outlawed pro-Castro group.

TEMPLEPATRICK

In Northern Ireland, the Police today discovered the bodies - of two more shooting victims; the first, in Belfast - the second, at nearby Templepatrick. A fortyyear-old business executive was also critically injured in a boobytrap bombing a few miles north of Belfast.

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NEWSCASTLE

Last year, in Britain, you may recall - a crippling coal strike; forcing the nation to consume much of its coal reserves - and leaving it still short of coal with another winter coming on. A desperate situation - and so a desperate solution.

The British Coal Board announcing plans to import thousands of tons of coal - from Vietnam. (The coals that once powered the Hanoi war machine - now being carried to London, Birmingham, Glasgow and, yes,) even to Newcastle.

HOUSTON

From Houston - the story of an aspiring quickshot artist; Robert Massey - age forty-five; out in a field all by himself - practicing quick draws - when somehow he shot himself in the leg; and by the time help arrived he had already bled to death.

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Quick draw - slow death.

GLACIER Parla-Bears.

Two young men from Indiana were reported in fair condition today - after being mauled by bears in Glacier National Park. The two victims out hiking in an area called Medicine Pass - when they apparently surprised two or three grizzlies in a berry patch. One suffering cuts that required two hundred stitches to close - while the other suffering a possible severed tendon in his right leg. When you think about it - really lucky they weren't torn to pieces.

A team of Rangers \bigwedge now attempting to track down the offending bears. A Ranger spokes man saying the Park's poor berry crop this year - may have been a contributing factor. The shortage of berries leading to fierce competition for food - even at lower elevations where grizzlies are normally seldom seen.
