## PARIS

On the peace front - Henry Kissinger returns to Paris; there to meet with Hanoi's Le Duct Tho - who was already on hand along with high officials of both South Vietnam and the Viet Cong.

Doctor Kissinger's departure - followed an hour long conference with President Nixon. His assignment still officially that of completing the text of "an agreement" on Vietnam. Unofficially, though comes a report that a cease fire could be initialed - perhaps as early as Wednesday with the formal signing - we are told - just "a few days later."

Meanwhile, a sudden arab lex outbreak of
fighting - about forty miles north of Saigon; with government troops catching a communist force apparently trying to sneak into the capital area.

This perhaps an attempt at a last minute land grabin anticipation of an in-place ceasefire.

Whatever the case - it didn't work. South

Vietnamese infantry men and armored units - putting
the enemy quickly to flight; with $U S B-52 s$ adding
to the pounding -- as the communists aux fled back into the jungle.

After peace - what next? Will the end
of the war in Vietnam - mean the freeing of additional funds for spending at home? That question was raised today - during a TV appearance by the President's top domestic advisor John Ehrlichman who promptly this actually
replied that said process- has now been going on for
four years. When the President first took office -
said Ehrichman - Defense spending accounted for
roughly forty-five percent of the whole federal budget;
when re today - said he - the figure is roughly thirty-
five percent which means, in short - he continued
"we are already spending the peace dividend."

> Next question: Is the President really
as isolated from adverse comment - as we've been
hearing of late." To which Ehrlichman replied - in effect, nonsense! Further observing that the President, actually "invites disagreement," At staff meetings. He asks one and all - we are told - "do you

disagree?" And then if the answer is yes - said

Ehrlichman - he'll draw you out."

WHITE HOUSE
A postscript on President Nixon's inaugural
address comes today from his daughter, Julie Nixon

Eisenhower; who said that the President added to his
speech - some thoughts that "came to him" just the
night before; the part - where he said:

> "As I stand in this place, so hallowed
by history -I think of others who have stood here
before me: I think of the dreams, they had for America;
and I think of how each recognized that he needed
help far beyond himself - in order to make those dreams
come true."

> "Today," the President continued - "I
aches your prayers that in the years ahead I may have God's help in making decisions that are right for America. And I pray for your help -he concluded - "so that together we may be worthy

SUPREME COURT
From the US Supreme Court -a land-mark
decision today in a highly controversial matter. The High court ruling, seven to to - that existing abortion laws in Texas and Georgia are unconstitutional; but more than that, setting up a three stage guideline for regulating future abortions throughout the country.

> In the first three months of pregaancy -
said the Court - a woman's doctor shall be the
sole judge of whether to perform an abortion; in the next three months - the state may establish procedures that are, "reasonably related to maternal health"
but after that - an unborn child shall have reached a state of viability" - said the Court; which means that then and only then can a state prohibit abortions except where the mother's life is in danger.

The worst single plane crash in all
history occurred today at Kano in Nigeria; that of a Jordanian airliner - returning a plane load of

Mandala Moslem from a pilgrimage to Mecca
attempting to land in dense fog when the pilot just missed the sedge of the runway; the plane then skidding into a ditch - scattering passengers in every direction; finally - bursting into flame;

The death toll at last report -
coming to one hundred and eighty; as compared with
a previous high of one-seventy-six; in the crash of
a Japanese airliner last October at Moscow. In this
one though, oddly enough - twenty-two persons,
including the pilot and five crew members managing
to survive the disaster. getting to safety - by means of emergency escape hatches.
At the Pentagon, Air Force Brigadier

General Jeanne Holm - was recommended today for
promotion to Major General the first woman ever
to attain such rank.
General Holm - the director of women in
the Air Force since Nineteen Sixty-Five. According to Defense Secretary Melvin Laird eminently
qualified for two genre star rank. Laird adding
that the Air Force - is thus way out ahead of all the other services.

HELSINKI

In talks at Helsinki aimed at clearing the way for an all-European security conference - the Nato allies last week suggested a tentative agenda among other things, calling for a "freer flow of ideas and information" - between East and West.

Now comes - the official Soviet response.

Russia's Viator Maltsev - agreeing for the
first time on the need for so-called "confidence building measures." Adding, however, "the agenda should not be stuffed with too many details. "Therefore urging efforts - aimed at achieving four main goals : Number one - a guarantee of European security; two - an expansion of East-West trade; three - an expansion of cultural relations; and four - the establishment of
a "consultative committee" - to deal with any future problems that might arise.
For the men of Apollo Seventeen - the last
of America's Moon men a visit today to Capitol Hill; where they received a traditional salute from congress
including standing ovations when they arrived, when they left, and before and after each of them spoke.

The landing of a man on the Moon - said Mission Commander Gene Cernan - "probably gained America more pride and more respect throughout the world - than anything that happened throughout
the two hundred year history of the nation."
