The White House - President Nixon met for three hours today with his cabinet, also with key campaign aides, and with GOP leaders in Congress. This to permit a thorough discussion of future campaign strategy, with special emphasis - we are told - on a grassroots effort to register additional Republican voters.

It was also announced today that President and Mrs.

Nixon will appear together - at a barbecue to be held next

week in San Antonio; the barbecue sponsored by former

Treasury Secretary John Connolly who heads the Democrats

for Nixon organization.

of Massachusets -- he met with Mayor Daley and members

grain sales to Russia. Said McGovern: "These investigations look about as fair and impartial - as the judging at the recent Olympics."

Meanwhile, at Olympic headquarters in Lausanne, Switz erland == a changing of the guard; with Avery Brundage - stepping down today as Olympic President, Furning ia the job over to Lord Killanin After which a press conference which Brundage again discussing the tragic events at Munich. He said saying, he was motivated to continue the games - by a determination to uphold the spirit of Olympic independence. "We had to fight political intrusion, as seen by the Rhodesian affair - said he; "and now, we even have criminal intent intrusion."

Brundage also said his first reaction

at becoming a "civilian" again - was, quote "a sense

of relief." Adding - at age eighty-five "Now - I

face a new life."

More on the Olympic tragedy - from

Jerusalem. where Israeli Prime Minister Golda Meir

was reporting today to a special session of the Israeli

Parliament -- defending herself against opposition

charges a that Israel should have handled its own

security at Munich.

This was not possible - said Madame

Meir. Adding that West German officials - had assumed while full responsibility. The lady Premier also said, there was "room for criticism" - at the way g West German rescue attempt was carried out, But she nevertheless, commended the West Germans - for refusing to give in to Arab demands. Further vowing that Israel will continue 'o "smite" Arab terrorists - "wherever it can reach them."

In the same vein UN Secretary General

Kurt Waldheim was condemning today - acts of

terrorism and violence against civilians. Adding

He says he has decided to place this matter 
"on the agenda of the General Assembly upcoming

twenty-seventh session. Waldheim street in the

UN in the face of such acts - "cannot be a mute

spectator."

Weeking of the Olympics - an assertion was
today that the Nineteen Seventy Six games should be
called off. This - from Senate Majority leader
Mike Mansfield, who charges that the Olympics becomes - "too political, too racial, too anarchist
too murderous." Adding: "The ideal behind them is
being dissipated - and they serve no useful purpose."

All of which will be of special interest out in Colorada; since the Senate votes later this week - on a proposed fifteen million dollar contribution toward the Nineteen Seventy-Six winter games which are scheduled there at Yail, Steamboat Springs and to be held of course, in and around Denver.

One year later - Attica revisited. A special citizens commission finally completing today its investigation of the bloodiest of all U S prison riots. The commission coming to the conclusion that the Attica uprising last September - was "a spontaneous burst of violent anger, not planned or organized in advance." Adding that once the riot started - the prisoners demand for amnesty was the main barrier to a peaceful solution; also, that Governor Rockefeller of New York - should have visited the scene.

The commission then going on to criticize - a riot ending assualt by state police; accusing the assault team - of "indiscriminate firing." As for reports of officers being attacked: "The inescapable conclusion that these reports were exaggerated" - said the panel. The commission further urging enactment - of a series of prison reforms; for lack of which - it said - another Attica prison riot could happen again at any time. The panel recommending that in case of future riots prisoners be seized quickly if possible; with

negotiations if any completely free of outside influences.

Also, "that the explosion that occurred <u>first</u> at

Attica, was probably by chance." Said the panel: "Attica
is every prison - and every prison is Attica."

From Jerez De La Frontera, Spain another chapter today in the life of Aldeanero, the brave bull.
