in the life of Argentina's Juan Peron - were finally

ended today by a fatal heart attack. Peron's death following

by just a year - his return to power after years

in exile. He was seventy-eight.

Peron's successor as President of Argentina - his third wife, Maria Estela Martinez de Peron; moving up from Vice President - to become the first woman President in the Western Hemisphere. The former cabaret dancer, age forty-three, pledging to fulfill, as she put it - "that which God and Peron have given me as a mission."

From Beirut, a report today that Palestinian

guerillas have agreed to stop using Lebanon - as a

springboard for attacks against Israel. This an attempt

to bring an end to Israeli reprisal raids - into Southern

Lebanon.

For President Nixon - a brief time-out today from official consultations with Soviet leaders. The
President flying to Minsk, newly-proclaimed a "Hero City"
- going for an interlude of sightseeing and relaxation.

For the first time, the President showing some discomfort - from his mild bout with phlebitis. Limping noticeably - as he stepped from his plane. His doctors say - it's nothing serious. Aside from his limp - "the President appeared relaxed and in good spirits."

Later on - it was back to Moscow, where Henry

Kissinger and Andrei Gromyko - were already drafting the

final summit communique.

Here at home - White House lawyers today filed their final brief - prior to oral arguments before the Supreme Court; again questioning the right of a Watergate grand jury - to name the President an "unindicted co-conspirator." The White House saying: "The Rresidency cannot function - if the President is preoccupied with the defense of a criminal case." Adding that "the thought of a President exercising his great powers from a jail cell - boggles.

Meanwhile, Chairman Rodino of the House Judiciary

Committee - reversing himself and the committee's

Democratic majority, agreeing today to hear all six witnesses

earlier requested by the White House.

Rodino also proposed today to speed up the tmpsackment proceedings & by denying committee members the right to personally question witnesses. The full House refusing, however - to suspend its normal rules.

Congressman Dennis of Indiana, for one, calling the Rodino proposal - an attempt at "parliamentary suicide."

And now The latest: The House panel voting to question its witnesses - behind closed doors.

The King of the Indian protectorate of Sikkim ended today his week-long mission to New Delhi. The King
flying back to Gangtok - after failing to win a restoration
of some of his lost powers. As he left, saying he may
decide to abdicate - rather than become a mere figurehead.
An aide stressing, however, that come what may - the King
"will stay in Sikkim."
