SATELLITE (L.T.-DELCO. FRIDAY, DEC. 19, 1958 (Given by Allan Jackson, L.T. in Zanzibar) Here's an announcement that came from Washington -Only this afternoon. / XXXXX a single line, reading - "Reporters at the Pentagon have just been called in for a news conference presumably on the Atlas satellite."

That was the word - we had all been waiting for. The high point of the news conference - a taped message from President Eisenhower. The message, beamed across space - from the artificial satellite launched by the Air Force last night. The Presidential message - was a simple one. Calling for peace on earth - in the spirit of Christmas. But it marked a dramatic break-through -- in the field of artificial satellites.

Tonight, this giant of the sky - is zooming through space. Turning end over end - like a drop-kick football. Only, a football the size of a pullman car - eighty-five feet long, and ten feet wide. Weighing - four and a half tons. Its speed - seventeen thousand miles an hour. Taking it around the earth - in just over an hour and a half.

The Air Force succeeded - on its first try.

SATELLITE - 2

Launching its Atlas rocket from Cape Canaveral - under the guidance of an electronic brain. The satellite went into orbit - right on schedule.

American experts point out - this feat means the Russians can't be much ahead of us. Their biggest Sputnik is - less than half the size of the Air Force satellite. So there's no reason to believe - that the Soviets have a rocket a lot more powerful than ours.

EISENHOWER

President Electrower was preparing to play host to the diplomatic corps - when news of success flashed from Cape Canaveral. The news, carried to the President - by his aide, General Goodpaster. Mr. Eisenhower and the First Lady immediately joined their guests. The President called for the Marine Band to stop playing - and revealed the fact that our biggest man-made moon was in orbit. A burst of applause followed. Then the festivities went on - amid much more excitement than is usual - at White House dinners.

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ALGERIA

Premier DeGaulle's delegate-general - arrived in Algiers today. Paul Delouvrier, receiving a chilly welcome but there were no demonstrations against him.

Special police stood on guard at the airport - because of the Right Wing crowds that had turned out - for General Salan. The General was a key figure in the Algerian uprising that brought DeGaulle to power. Salan, an idol of the Right Wing in Algeria. But Delouvrier moved to head off the Right Wingers, with an airport declaration that - "France will remain here." After which, he drove to his official residence - without any trouble.

BERLIN

The Russians are threatening to start a war - if the West tries to stay in Berlin by force. Soviet General Zaharov, declaring - he has thirty divisions to use, if the Russians decide to cut Berlin off from West Germany. The Soviet commander directed his threats - directly at his opposite number. American General Henry Hodes had warned the Russians - not to try another Berlin blockade. Now Zaharov answers - that he's ready to blockade Berlin. And this time - the West will be stopped by force.

NATO

With the Russians making belligerent gestures - the head of Nato has something to say about - any possible aggression General Norstad told a Nato meeting in Paris - his command definitely will use nuclear weapons - if the Russians begin a drive west. The commander of the international alliance said he wants to keep the Kremlin from miscalculating. Norstad adding, Soviet aggression is very improbable - as long as Khrushchev knows the true strength of Nato. Especially in atomic weapons.

BULGANIN

The former Soviet Premier confessing a his political sins - gives an odd twist to the struggle for power - in the Soviet Union. Bulganin's confession sounds like - <u>counde-like</u> something from the era of Stalin's purge trials. The victim, beating his breast in repentence - calling on the Party to punish him, as he deserves. Which makes Khrushchev - look like another Stalin.

But Bulganin is tabbed as - a Stalinist. The same as -Molotov and Kaganovich. And Khrushchev is - the anti-Stalinist. The upshot? Khrushchev, using Stalin's methods to stay in power. And using his power - to overthrow Stalinism.

MYSTERY

American officials in Vienna, are trying to find out what happened to one American - who went behind the Iron Curtain and never came back. William Merriwether, and his Austrian wifeboth died in East Germany. The East German Reds claiming - the Merriwethers were killed by a hit-and-run driver. But a relative who identified the bodies - found no signs of external injury. And the Reds guickly cremated - the remains.

The whole incident, so mysterious - that our Viennese Embassy is asking East Berlin for a full report on the Merriwethers.

SYRIA

Syria is suffering **REME** economically - because of her federation with Egypt. So say representatives from Damascus now in Cairo. They're asking Nasser - to do something about it. Nasser - head of the United Arab Republic - which is made up of Syria and Egypt.

The greatest grievance in Damascus - concerns imports. The new laws passed by the U.A.R. - cutting down on the goods coming into Syria. According to the Syrians, all Nasser has done by supporting these laws - is to increase the number of smugglers operating across Syria's frontiers.

GOLDFINE

Industrialist Bernard Goldfine is guilty of - contempt of court. The charge - refusing to turn over documents - bearing on an income tax case. Found guilty along with Goldfine - his secretary, Mildred Paperman.

This ruling, made by a judge in Boston. At the time, Goldfine was in Washington - pleading innocent to another charge. The charge of - contempt of Congress. Fire fighters are being rushed to southern California - by helicopter. Their job - to stop the worst brush fire in years. A hundred square miles of timberland have already been devastated. Twenty buildings - going up in smoke. The flames, moving toward - historic San Juan Capistrano Mission. But California forest rangers believe, they'll have the fire under control - before it h reaches the mission.

CAPTAIN

A vessel of the Holland-America Line docked at Hoboken, New Jersey, today - nearly two days late. The reason for the delay - a freak accident. The Captain was in the wheel house during a storm. Suddenly a giant wave - broke over the wheel house. Smashing the windows - hurling the Captain and his two mates, against the wall. The Captain was severely cut - by flying glass. The shipis doctor was afraid - that he might lose the sight of one eye. So they put back into an Irish port - where the patient could be treated. Two days later he was on the job again. Bringing his vessel safely across the Atlantic this time - into Hoboken.

BOMBARDMENT

Now, here's to the artillery men of Viamo - Brazil. Today, they were holding - gunnery practice. Letting fly with - a terrific bombardment of non-explosive shells. The only trouble being - they had their guns pointed the wrong way.

Shells began to fall all over Viamo. One store was knocked to pieces. A cemetery - torn up. A school playground - disrupted. Worshippers in one church were startled - as a shell came in one window, and went out the other.

No one was hurt. But a lot of villagers ducked for cover. Hiding - Don - from the bombardment launched by - those enthusiastic artillery men of Viamo.

HULA

England reports an epidemic of - the "hula hoop disease." Patients, arriving at the hospital with severe pain in their necks and stomachs. Some cases, diagnosed as - polio. Others as - meningitis.

But the patients recovered - too fast. Which puzzled the medicos - until they connected the ailments with the hula hoop. Beginners, coming down with - sore muscles.

One patient - a sixty-eight year old woman. Her doctor told her - except for her age - he would suspect the hula hoop.
