## CLARK

At long last the start of the fourth and final phase of operation Homecoming. The last of American POW's held in South Vietnam arriving today at Clark Air Force Base in the Philippines. Thirty-two men in all led by Army Colonel Benjamin Purcell of Columbus, Georgia. "Man's most precious possession - second only to life - is freedom," said Colonel Purcell. Adding: "Today, thirty-two of us have regained our freedom - and the chance to start again our life."

Another fifty held in Laos and North Vietnam - are due to start home tonight. Then sixty-seven more - a day later.

Meanwhile, the U.S. was resuming its troop
withdrawals from South Vietnam. Nearly a thousand men
heading home today - with the final five thousand or so soon
to follow.

Meanwhile, there was a continuation of heavy fighting in Cambodia. Communist forces - attempting to isolate the Cambodian capitol of Phnom Penh. This apparently undeterred - by heavy U.S. bombing. The White House, nevertheless stresses that the bombing will continue - until "such time as there is a cease-fire in Cambodia."

The White House again - 1the President Nixon today vetoed & a two point six billion dollar vocational rehabilitation bill; calling it one of several bills introduced in Congress "which mask bad legislation beneath alluring labels."

And that - said he - "would force upon the unacceptable choice of either raising taxes substantially" - or again risking an inflationary

Chou also saying: The world has cried about six

hundred American prisoners of war in Vietnam - but has not

India. And he added: If the world press wants justice 
then it must point that out - too."

At Amsterdam - a three-day Europe-America conference; aimed at finding solutions -- to problems that currently be-set the Western alliance. Except that today's main speaker - was really stressing the positive over the negative.

Former U S Under Secretary of State Eugene
Rostow - asserting the world is not splitting into blocks,
as some would have him believe. Rather it's becoming
"so tightly integrated" - said he - "that it may soon have

The seeming discovery of a long sought, all-powerful shark repellent - is reported today from the remote Gulf of Akaba. Dr. Eugene Clark of the University of Maryland coming across a species of fish called the Red Sea Sole; a fish only six to nine inches long - but capable of emitting a wondrous milk-like substance.

This substance, whatever it is - in its natural state - apparently harmless to humans. When mixed with sea water though - quickly producing convulsions, paralysis, hemorrhage and death in small fish. Portions of Red Sea Sole - have also been offered to small sharks.

Doctors Clark reporting: That when the preditors bared their razor sharp teeth - and opened their mouths to gulp it down - instant lock jaw!

The next step in the doctor's testing program will take him into the nearby Red Sea of which the Gulf of Akaba is an arm, where he intends to test the Sole on tiger shark measuring up to eighteen feet in length; fearsome creatures

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that have been known to eat - not only marine life but

sea birds - tin cans - lumps of coal - and, in one case,
