And to believe, but President

Mennedy already can look back on - the history of his
administration. His first year in office is now

documented in the latest volume of - "Public Papers

of the Presidents." This one, a massive nine hundred

page tome - containing Kennedy addresses, messages to

Congress, news conference transcripts, and so on.

In his introduction to the volume, the President reflects on his first year as chief executive. What strikes him most - about the Presidential history that he's made so far? He says: - "Fresh beginnings and new momentum."

Observers close to the White "ouse say the President has passed the following word on the steel issue: - "avoid any punative attitude toward the industry." Officials of the administration are ordered to bend over backward - to make it plain that the companies are not under fire; that harmony can and should be restored - now that the six dollar hike in steel prices has been rescinded.

The administration no longer has to plan for a special increase in the cost of government, says Secretary of Defense McNamara, because his department won't have to pay that extra billion. At the White House and the Pentagon, they are talking about - magnanimity.

About that difference of opinion between the United States and West Germany. Washington admits that Bonn is holding up - the presentation of the new American plan to the Soviet Union because the West Germans are so fiercely critical of any plan that offers East Germany a show of legitimacy. Today, the West German newspapers were almost unanimous, in urging Chancellor Adenauer to insist on clarification of our attitude, Meanwhile, Secretary of State Rusk is marking time. Confining himself to procedural questions in his talks with the Soviet Ambassador.

EAST GERMANY

From East Germany, comes a confession that behind the Iron Curtain this is a serious food shortage. The Marxists planners boasted in January, that before the end of Spring - the collective farms would produce a million tons of vegetables. Now they admit that the East German farmers - fulfilled only two thirds of this agricultural plan. The shortage - more than three hundred thousand tons; in a land that used to be famous for its bumper harvest. Few turnips in the place that made the turnip famous. Not enough food to go around.
