America's newest space heroes, astronauts

America's newest space heroes, Astronauts adyar know Shepard, Mitchell and Roosa are headed home tonight at a speed of more than three thousand miles per hour. The big moment - the home coming splash down is scheduled to take place in the Pacific some nine hundred miles of Samoa at four-oh-five tomorrow afternoon - Eastern Time. So far the forecast is for near perfect weather. Riding with the astronauts is a collection of more than a hundred pounds of Moon rocks - as well as the future of the American space program itself.

In Moscow the Soviets announced that the eight wheeled moon buggy - which landed on the Moon last November - has gone back to work in the Sea of Rains about three hundred miles from the spot just visited by the American astronauts. The self-propelled Moon robot steered by Russian properating and on earth.

First reports say Allied troops are meeting sliff resistance from North Vietnamese forces in Laos # as they attes drive into that country on a mission to cut the Communist Ho Chi Minh Trail. No American troops are taking part in the land action according to the reports. But six U S helicopters were shot down and two American pilots killed. More than two hundred American planes and helicopters are flying tactical support missions for some five thousand South Vietnamese troops who crossed the Laotian border into Laos. The Laotian Chief of State Prince Souvanna Phouma -- today protested the invasion and demanded immediate withdrawal of all foreign troops from his country - including those of the North Vietnamese. In Ottawa the Canadian government reacted by calling for a re-convening of the international control commission of Laos to

investigate Prince Souvanna Phouma's complaints.

In Washington the new fighting brought more demands that congress take action to restrict a wider American Anvolvment in South East Asia's Foreign Relations chairman William Fulbright called Secretary of State Rogers into a closed committee meeting tomorrow morning. In Saigon, South Vietnamese President Phieu promised to withdraw all his country's troops from Laos as soon as Communist supplies are destroyed and infiltration routes are cut. Meantime from London comes diplomatic reports that Russia is increasing its flow of arms to north Vietnam begin because of the intensified fighting.

President Nixon sent an eighteen page message to Congress today asking for tough controls in the fight against air and water pollution. Among his proposals a federal program for the re-cycling of his paper to help preserve our national forests Aimprovements in pesticide control, 44 regulation of noise pollution, 4 further restrictions on ocean dumping, and regulations further to prevent strip mining from damaging the environment. Said the President -- the "the program I propose will require some adjustments by government - by our industrial and business community, and by the public. But the battle for a better environment can be won, and we are winning it."

Also in Washington, the mayors of sixteen large cities asked Congress for permission to hire the unemployment unemployed for public service jobs.
